CANADA HAS LEARNED TO PRODUCE AND LEND

Sir Herbert Ames Urges Women to Interest Themselves in Economic Ouestions.

To arouse interest among the women of Toronto in the matter of saving for patriotic and general ecor purposes was the reason for the address given by Sir Hertert Ames at gathering in the Masonic Temple vesterday afternoon. Two billion dollars have been anni-

hilated during the war was a state-ment which needed some more than ordinary power of the audience to visualize. This two billion must be put back in some way, said the speak.

er who expressed the opinion that if Rip Van Winkle came back now he would consider the state of Canada hopeless. At the same time while this pessimistic verdict might have applied to this country ten years ago, it does not do so now, because the war has taught Canada to produce, save, lend and back up the government. The Dominion government recognizes the gravity of the situation and the spirit of the people which the war has brought into being.

A difference between the plan which the government proposes as a means to bring back the money which has been lost and the plan adopted at Victory Loan campaigns is that war savings stamps and bonds, which are now being introduced, are to represent a continuous and what it is hoped will be a permanent drive. Sin Herbert then explained the meaning of the war saving stamp and thrift stamps, the latter of which may be bought for 25 cents and when 16 are placed on a thrift card they may be exchanged for a war saving stamp, which in January, 1924, will bring the investor \$5. The loan will have assisted the government and at the same time have proved a good investment for the holder.

The speaker stated there were two reasons for not attempting to raise money again thru the medium of the Victory Loan, the first being that it would now be a very difficult thing to do when the enthusiasm of the war period is over and the second, that the present plan makes a better distribution of the burden among the people. The success of the movement in England has been proved by the sale amounting to one and a quarter billion and in the United States at the rate of \$70,000,000 a month, or \$20 a head in Great Britain and \$10 a head in the United States since the plan was launched. What Canada proposes is to raise \$50,000,000, or six and a half per capita monthly.

The purposes to which the money will be applied, according to the speaker, are to assist repatriation and construction by enabling the government to extend railroads, build ships, place soldiers on the land and to give credit to countries abreas to the No More Loans.
