TUBERCULOSIS CRUSADE. IS LED BY ROOSEVELT. Issues Stringent Orders Governing the Prevention of Disease Among Government Employees.

Washington, March 8.—The crusade against the spread of tuberculosis among the employees of the government service here was to-day directed by President Roosevelt, who issued an order to the heads of all departments, giving them explicit instructions as to their duties in combating the disease.

It shall be the duty of the head of each of the executive departments in Washington, says the order, 'to cause to be printed and transmitted to all the federal buildings under his control the rules prepared by the said committee to prevent the spread of tuberculosis in the buildings, and to require their display by the custodian in such manner and in such number as is necessary to carry out the intent of the rules.'

It is hereby required of each department to ascertain the names of any persons in service in said department afflicted with tuberculosis, and to present to them the printed rules prescribed by said committee for their observance. The non-observance said rules shall, in the discretion of the head of the department, be considered a just cause for separation from the service.

Whenever there is a doubt with regard to any person in the government service as to whether said person is afflicted with pulmonary tuberculosis, an order shall be issued for the said person to present himself (or herself) to one of the government laboratories for examination and present to the department the largest show of short-term certificate ever held in the Dominion. There will be \$4000 in prize, and Sir William Moulton has entered his select herd of 25 to Boston.
