WOMAN'S WORLD

The linen gown. For some years past linen has been steadily gaining in favor, and at all the fashion centres in London and Paris a great future is foretold for linen costumes this season. Generally speaking, the linen gown is a tailor-made article pure and simple, but the vogue for the little bolero has emboldened numbers of dressmakers to undertake various mitigations of this rule, and some charming examples are the result.

The cape bolero is for economical reasons one of the most satisfactory of garments imaginable. Being open in front and furnished with sleeves which reach no further than the elbow, it preserves as fresh and smart appearance long after a long-sleeved and long-skirted gown would be creased and tumbled. Many women are for this reason having two skirts made to wear alternately with one bolero, altho a number still adhere to the little sacque coat so fashioned as to reach just as far as the hips and furnished with "wrist-long" sleeves, which soil almost as quickly as a skirt.

Where white embroidered linen is concerned a coat costume is out of the question, and the prettiest method of treatment is undoubtedly the pinafore frock, with which is worn a little vest or gilette of clear muslin and lace, the whole of the front of the costume being adorned with broderie. It has been at frequently affirmed that in London linen represents the most extravagant wear that numbers of people, sooner than abjure it altogether, have adopted dainty frocks, which, while washing every whit as well as white, requires far fewer immersions in the wash-tub. The most popular color is, of course, the ultra-fashionable "frambiose," which is perhaps more charming in "toile" than any other material, and is being largely exploited by the leading dressmakers. A pretty example was carried out with a short cape bolero scalloped all round, the material of the tube being put on in layers scalloped at the base to simulate the three-tiered skirt.

In Paris, numbers of the linen gowns are mounted on silk foundations, and, in addition to ingratitudes, of costly lace, are being piped with striped black and white silk or adorned with rare silk embroideries, out on this side of the channel the linen is invariably intended for useful wear and looked on essentially as a washing gown. Consequently, the simplest of skirt trimmings are preferred, and besides washing braid, tucks, lace insertions, and incrustations, the severe workmanlike style which makes it so admirably suited for outdoor wear.

So much of the effect of a linen frock depends upon its freshness that numbers of women subject it to a little amateur treatment in the matter of laundering and iron it frequently.

Wild Flowers. The novelty of the moment, the denizens of field and hedgerow being a rule carried out either in exaggerated size or of the most minute dimensions. The most popular are mammoth field daisies with black velvet centres and large silken petals, and these are often massed round the borders of the toques with a bunch of feathery grasses placed on one side. Meadow sweet is frequently combined with kingcups and dandelions on the fashionable leghorn straws, the only other adornment being loops of narrow black velvet ribbon and a softening of white tulle.

Fichu Capes. Many of the new gowns of muslin or lace are accompanied by little fichu-shaped capes of tulle, caught in the centre of the back with large buckles and falling in two long shawls over the skirt. These are usually carried out in the old-fashioned faded greens and blues, or in the newer soft and flabby, whose curves are highly strung and at the verge of collapse, and whose vital organs are tightened and compressed into the shape determined by the modiste. Happily in these days of enlightened thought the evil of tight lacing has been considerably diminished, tho it is by no means banished. Steeple and bones are still fairly used in the staging of the figure into the required form, even by many who frown most heavily on tight lacing, and the used sparingly and carefully there may be little harm in these implements, yet the custom runs to the other extreme.

The question of hygiene or the care of the body is an all-important one, yet is such neglected, even in the matter of the daily bath. The perfectly cold-induced many women are not able, physically, to endure the shock of cold water—but a sponge bath in tepid water in the evening, heated room at least once a day is within the reach of all, and takes but little time. A good stiff rubbing is the essential part of the treatment, and the use of towel and afterwards with the palm of the hand until the skin tingles and glows, and the world is your own.

North Toronto.
Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Dunnett of Bedford Park are visiting friends at Brackbridge.

Since the opening of the excursion season the Metropolitan power house company is busy carrying picnic parties to Bond's Lake and other places.

Robt. Drewry, who has all the faith and sold two new houses this season. For the last house he sold on Balliol-street, he realized \$2550. Mr. Drewry has already a gang of men employed to build another house at Yonge and Balliol-streets.

An agitation is developing in Deer Park and the south end of the town. The residents are protesting against the Metropolitan power house company's use of the blackest of coal, the smoke continuously belched forth from the stack pervading the atmosphere within a circumference of half a mile with greasy soot that spells ruin to everything with which it comes in contact.

Deer Park. Annexation to the city is the topic these days. "We are continually asked to pay heavy taxes," said a ratepayer, "and in return we get nothing but smoke. Just fancy a district like Deer Park with its heavy assessment, and only one corporation laborer can be seen now and then replacing a broken plank with a half decayed one."

Bracebridge.
The Bracebridge annexationists are not so readily defeated as some people wish they could be. At the public meeting a week or so ago a committee was appointed to see and confer with the board of control of Toronto. The committee had an interview. The controllers told the representatives that if Bracebridge wishes to annex to the city the district has to come in unconditionally, and in the meantime the board of control will have an automobile ride around the district. So far the controllers have not been in the district, but the annexation committee is calling another public meeting, to be held at Hillcrest Public School on Monday evening next.

York County Council.
Councillor Woodcock again introduced his measure in county council yesterday to rescind the bylaw awarding \$25 for information leading up to the arrest of automobilists violating the speed limit. Councillor Evans said the bylaw was passed in the hope that the legislature would ratify it. The opinion was that, while illegal, the bylaw had exercised a restraining influence, and it was decided to make the reward \$10, the limit authorized by the legislature. A big deputation came down from North York to press the request for a reopening of the Davidson case. The charges preferred against the inspector are said to be numerous, but trivial, and yesterday H. S. and Mayor Roadhouse, T. H. Bruntin, W. C. Widdifield, Danford Rocha, William Reames, W. G. Jackson, R. O. Harvey and Geo. H. Richardson secured from council an assurance that Davidson would be given an opportunity to answer the charges. R. D. Harvey charged council with forcing the inspector to hand in his resignation and characterized the council as "a drying body." The matter will be taken up at 3 o'clock this afternoon. Mr. Milloy, who was appointed to the position, has since resigned. The time for completing the assessment of York Township was extended.

Queensville.
A branch of the Sovereign Bank has been opened at Queensville under the management of F. A. M. Lister of the Newmarket branch.

ROOSEVELT NOT SATISFIED.
Meat Inspection Bill He Declares is Quite Inadequate.

Washington, June 14.—President Roosevelt to-day expressed entire disapproval of the new meat inspection bill as completed by the house committee on agriculture.

He expressed this view to-day to Chairman Wadsworth of the house committee, when Mr. Wadsworth called on him and submitted a draft of the new measure and asked the president's opinion.

The president declared that the bill was not at all adequate to meet the conditions. George Ross, deputy postmaster, yesterday entered upon his 33d year of service with the department.
