Wild Flowers.

Wild flowers are (in millinery) the novelty of the moment, the denizens of field and hedgerow being as a rule carried out either in exaggerated size or of the most minute dimensions. The most popular are mammoth field daisies with black velvet centres and large silken petals, and these are often massed round the borders of the toques with a bunch of feathery grasses placed on one side. Meadow sweet is frequently combined with kingcups and dandelions on the fashionable leghorn straws, the only other adornment being loops of narrow black velvet ribbon and a softening of white tuile.


