SPANISH TROOPS WILL RETURN TO SPAIN

It Was a Conditional Capitulation at Uncle Sam's Own Terms-A Commission Will be Appointed to Arrange For Carrying Out the Terms of Surrender-Major-General Miles Cives Credit to General Shafter, the Officers and Men-Yellow Fever Patients to be Specially Cared for.

Washington, July 14 .- The War Department has received the following despatch from General Miles, written apparently before the final surrender of Santiago at 3 o'clock

Playa del Este, July 14 .- Secretary of War, Washington : Before Santiago, July 14 .- General Toral formally surrendered the troops of his army-troops and division of Santiago-on the terms and understanding that his troops shall be returned to Spain. General Shafter will appoint commissioners to draw up the conditions of arrangements for carrying out the terms of surrender.


