London, Dec. 1 .- "Buller Sunday" passed without serious incident. The government had taken every precaution to prevent disturbances. This included the reading at three parades last week of a special order in the military regulations, which forbids officers or soldiers from "taking part in meetings, demonstrations or processions for party or political purposes." A large body of police, many of whom were mounted, were stationed along the line of the procession's march, and notably in front of the War Office. Swede THOUSANDS OF SPECTATORS.

The trades unions and workmen's societies, with bands and banners, assembled along the embankment this afternoon. There were thousands of spectators. Owing to the difficulty of marshalling the large bodies of men, the procession was late in starting. It was headed by a huge banner, on which was a portrait of General Buller. The procession traversed Northumberland-avenue, Pall Mall, St. James-street, and Piccadilly to Hyde Park. The windows of clubland, especially of the service clubs, were crowded with cheered until they couldn't see straight. sightseers. At Charing Cross several mounted policemen rode up to the head of the procession and attempted to seize a plaster bust of General Buller. The man carrying the bust dashed it to the ground. This incident caused much indignation, but the leaders were able to curb and restrain the paraders, some of whom wished to attack the policemen.

When Hyde Park was reached it was almost dark. Here speeches from several platforms, representing England, Ireland, Scotland, Wales, Devon shire and the colonies, were made. The confusion was so great as to render the words of the speakers almost inaudible, but, amid a roar of cheers, a resolution of sympathy for General Buller was passed and adopted with great enthusiasm and a wild waving of handkerchiefs and hats. Features of the demonstrations were the passing of collection boxes for a workingmen's memorial to General Buller and the large sale of buttonhols It is estimated that 50,000 people were present at the demonstration in Hyde Park. ANTI-BRITISH LEAGUE.

One Formed in Russia, But It Has Few Members. St. Petersburg, Dec. 1.-The

General Attempt Made to Cut the Cordon Repulsed With Considerable Loss-Strathcona Interested in the King's Colonials-Do Boers Recruit Canadians?

London, Dec. 1 .- A despatch from Pretoria says that the Boers, on the night of Nov. 26, made a general attempt to break the blockhouse cordon along the railway west of Middleburg, but were repulsed with, it is thought, considerable loss. An armored train turned back the main body of 200 of the enemy, and the garrisons of the blockhouses checked the attacking party at other points.

ESCAPING FROM CAMPS.

A despatch to The Daily Mail from Pretoria gives indications why, with continuous captures, the Boer forces do not seem to diminish. The despatch says the Boers are constantly escaping from the concentration camps and towns to rejoin the fighting forces, and that measures will have to be taken to stop this leakage. The Boers in the town are still irreconcilable, says the despatch, and believe their cause will eventually trumph.

BOERS' RAPID MOVEMENTS. The correspondent at Pretoria writes that the Boers' powers of rapid movement and concentration still foil the efforts of the British military intelligence officers attached to the various columns. The Boers come in as fast as the fastest scout, who are looking out for them, and their attack is delivered before warning can be given, even in cases where the intentions of wernment, the army and the navy, were the Boers are partly known beforehand. As an example of quick moving, battling for supremacy on the football field he says that Louis Botha, with 600 men, covered 60 miles in 12 hours, in order to arrive at Brakenläagte, to help Grobeler against Colonel Benson. STRATHCONA IS INTERESTED.

The new corps, which has provisionally assumed the title of the King's Colonials, is making satisfactory progress with recruiting operations. Complete arrangements are being made for thoro instruction of the troopers in riding, shooting and other exercises necessary to efficiency. Assistance has been afforded to the originators of the corps by the agents-general of the various colonial governments, while Lord Strathcona is personally interest ing himself in the movement.

TO PREVENT EMIGRATION.

The War Office authorities have taken definite steps to prevent any further emigration to South Africa for the present. News that the Rand mines were gradually restarting operations has led to many demands for passage to the Cape, and it has been found necessary to announce that there are thousands of persons waiting at Cape Town and other ports for an opportunity to return to their homes in Johannesburg, and these will have precedence over later arrivals from England. The government has issued a notification that, owing to the proclamation of martial law in Cape Colony and Natal, nobody unprovided with a permit will be allowed to land in South Africa after Jan. 1.
