—Rev. Dr. Torrance, of Peterboro, who will preach in St. Andrew's Church tomorrow, is pastor of one of the largest churches in Central Ontario. He is still remembered in London by many, as in his student days he supplied St. Andrew's pulpit for several weeks during the last year of Dr. Scott's pastorate.

—Rev. Morgan Wood, pastor of Bond Street Church, Toronto, will preach at both services at the First Congregational Church tomorrow. He is well known in this city as an able and original speaker. The services will be held in the afternoon at 4 o'clock, at which he will deliver an interesting address. All men are welcome.

—At the last regular meeting of Pine Grove Camp, No. 2, Woodmen of the World, held in their hall, East London, a lot of new timber was brought in the camp. Sov. McKim is on the war path. —At the school room of the North Presbyterian Church, Westminster, on Thursday evening Prof. Laing, of Essex Center, gave a very interesting and instructive address on astronomy, giving to the audience a view of the infinite wonder, magnitude, grandeur and perfection of the starry heavens, dwelling principally on the movements of the planets in the solar system. He had with him an instrument of his own invention, which is considered the best for the purpose in the world, showing the various movements of these planets around the sun. It is designed to be of use in schools. The board of education in London have purchased several.

—The question of increasing the salaries of the teachers in the West London school was considered at a meeting of No. 1 committee of the board of education, held on Jan. 1. It was also recommended that Miss Weir's salary be fixed at \$350 a year, and that an increase of \$25 be made annually until the limit is reached. Miss Abbott was appointed assistant to Miss Skelton at Simcoe street school, and Miss Hinson's leave of absence was extended until the end of the term. This is owing to her continued poor health. This is most thankfully acknowledged.

—South London Council, No. 297, R. T. of T. held their regular meeting in the A. O. F. Hall, South London, last Thursday evening, with a good attendance. Select Councilor Littlejohn in the chair. A communication was read from the secretary of the Dominion Alliance regarding the coming prohibition plebiscite convention to be held in the Horticultural Pavilion, Toronto, on July 5, requesting two delegates to be sent. Bros. R. R. Nelson and A. P. Yeo were appointed. A candidate was initiated in the Royal Degree, and also raised to the Select Degree at an after-meeting. The silver medal contest, which was to have been held that evening was postponed until a week later, when it will be held in the Knox Church Sunday school on May 12. The committee reported that the full number of contestants were ready, and that a good musical programme had been provided. At the close a few choice selections were given by Bros. Littlejohn and Sisters J. Ramsay and Rudd.
