Members of the Seventh Battalion

The Balance to Go Into the Regimental Fund_Will Be Compelled to Turn Out-Officer's Opinion.

There are many young men in the city who would "soldier" provided there was anything else in it besides drill and glory. Those at present in the Seventh Battalion joined at the time the agreement existed that all the pay for their annual drills would go into the company fund. This rule, however, has been set aside, and now every member of the battalion who has put in the requisite number of drills will receive two-thirds of his pay. which will be \$4, and the remaining \$2 will go into the regimental fund. The company inspection will be held Nov. 3, 4 and 5, and the battalion inspection on Nov. 6. After this the

men will be paid their money. One of the officers said this morn ing that all the members would be compelled to turn out to put in the drills between now and the inspection, even if it became necessary to a corporal's guard after them. He said he fully approved of compelling men to put in their drill, because there terest and dilatoriness for their absence. 
