> Washington, Aug. 11.—"In the business of selling petroleum products in foreign countries, the price policy of the Standard Oil Company has apparently been to sacrifice the interests of the American consumer for the purpose of securing the Standard's for-

eign business." This direct charge is made in a official report to President Roosevelt by Herbert Knox Smith, commissioner of corporations, in submitting to him the operations of the Standard Oil Company by the bureau of corporations. Part three of the report, dealing with discrimination in prices, was made public today by Commissioner Smith. It consists of a detailed summary of the work of the investigators and a letter of transmittal of the re-

port to the President. Commissioner Smith asserts that the Standard, enjoying practically an absolute monopoly of the oil trade in the United States, has charged "such prices as it could thereby extort, and the American consumer has had to pay these prices.
