

Young Farmer Shoots His Two Little Girls and Attempts Suicide.

Montreal, April 3.—William Simpson, a young farmer of Hudson Heights, was brought to Notre Dame Hospital today suffering from self-inflicted bullet wounds, and if he recovers will have to face the serious charge of having murdered his two young children by shooting. The tragedy occurred yesterday forenoon at the home of Simpson, about three miles outside the village of Hudson Heights. Simpson shot his 2-month-old child, and then a 2-year-old one, both of them girls. He afterwards turned the gun on himself. Mrs. Simpson was present at the time of the tragedy, but beyond threatening her and pointing the revolver at her, her husband did her no injury.

HARRIMAN'S AMBITIONS

President's Friends Say Railway King Was After a Senatorship.

Washington, April 3.—Secretary Loeb said today that there would not be any further announcements from the President bearing on the issue between him and Mr. Harriman.

It was authoritatively declared at the White House today that the real reason for Mr. Harriman's interest in the election of the state ticket in New York in 1904 was that he desired to advance his own ambitions. It is asserted that Mr. Harriman wanted the position of senator, now filled by Mr. Dewey, and that this was the reason why he was anxious to have him appointed ambassador to Paris. The inference from Mr. Harriman's attitude was that if Senator Dewey could be induced to go to Paris, Governor Higgins was prepared to appoint him to the vacancy.

HINT TO THE U. S. THROUGH BRYCE

"What We Have We Hold," Says Lieut.-Governor Significantly to the Ambassador.

Toronto, April 3.—Seldom has there been such enthusiasm at the Canadian Club as was manifested this afternoon, when the Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario, James Bryce, British ambassador to the United States, that a little back-bone would be appreciated by Canadians in Britain's negotiations with the United States. Himself from Aberdeen, Mr. Clark was pleased to welcome one who had represented that constituency for many years, and must therefore be a "sticker." He evidently approved of that good motto, "What we have we hold," and that, he said, "is a pretty good sentiment to take across the line." The point was conveyed to Mr. Bryce with a delicacy and, at the same time, an unmistakable plainness that drew forth a burst of thunderous applause. To cap the climax, the Lieutenant-Governor, when this had subsided, naively remarked that it was very fortunate to have the ambassador present at an occasion when he could so well judge Canadian sentiment. He also wittily referred to Mr. Bryce's remark that Switzerland was "squeezed" by powerful neighbors, and more than hinted that Switzerland was not the only case. Judging from the remarks of members on leaving the banquet hall, Mr. Clark was one of the most appreciated that he has delivered since taking office.

JAIL FOR FLOGGING

Stern Justice for Avengers of Insulted White Women in East Africa.

Mombasa, East Africa, April 3.—The recent flogging of natives by Europeans at Nairobi for insulting white women has been followed by the prosecution of those accused of the flogging and those who abetted them.

As a result, Capt. Grogan, president of the Colonists' Association, has been sentenced to a month's imprisonment and to pay a fine of 500 rupees. Two other prominent colonists, Messrs. Bowker and Gray, have each been sentenced to two weeks' imprisonment.

Two of their abettors, who are also prominent, were sentenced to a fortnight's imprisonment.

The whites are very indignant over the sentences. Capt. Grogan is a well-known explorer and writer. He walked from Cape Town to Cairo, 6,500 miles, in 1898-99.
