TORONTO, June 3.—It was only after considerable explaining as to the folly of such a thing, that a delegate at the farmers' convention under the auspices of the United Farmers of Ontario, in the Labor Temple, Saturday, was persuaded to withdraw a motion that the governor-general be requested to dissolve the present Union Government. The seconder of the motion was equally as reluctant to suppress such an expression of the feelings of the delegates caused by the Government in passing the recent order-in-council regarding military service for young men on the farms.

On the understanding that the committee that is to go to Ottawa to further press the wishes of the farmers would follow out this plan should all others fail, the question was a lowed to drop for the time being.

Evidence on the part of some delegates favoring forceful action was not lacking, and at the meeting was very enthusiastic in the regard, but the Judgment and counsel of the leaders prevailed in the end, and it was finally decided to act mederately and with due consideration, the point being made that the way to attack the members individually at election time.
