He was detained there for some time, later sent to Hanover. However, on November 9, he was again removed to a big concentration camp at Spaudau, near Berlin, where he has been ever since as far as is known. This camp had been formerly used as a racecourse and accommodated about 3,000 foreign civilian prisoners.

MONTENEGRIN KING HAS BEEN DEPOSED

Skupshtina Is Claimed To Have No Constitutional Existence.

Paris, Dec. 4.—The Royal Montenegrin Government has issued a statement denying that King Nicholas has been denosed.

The statement points out that the Skupshtina has no constitutional exisence, and that the only body having authority of making any pronouncement as to the sovereignty of the state is the national parliament. This body, it is said, cannot meet at present, many members being confined in Austrian prisons or living abroad.

"My deposition was but a straw cast to see which way the wind blows," said King Nicholas of Montenegro to a Matin representative yesterday.

"If a meeting was held at Podgoritza (where the Montenegrin national assembly is reported to have met), I have not the slightest news of it. A meeting such as that one could have been held only under the shadow of bayonets. A legal plebiscite is not carried out by armed force. That is why I consider what has passed down there as being without importance."




