MUSICAL SOCIETY IS FORMED IN N. TORONTO

Town Will Soon Have Brass Band—West Toronto Man's Clever Work—County News.

NORTH TORONTO, Aug. 17.—(Special.)—That North Toronto will shortly have an up-to-date brass band, the equal of any provincial town, is now assured.

It was a good meeting as such meetings go, not large, but full of enthusiasm and attended by men who are in earnest and who will not stop short of success.

S. J. Douglas was in the chair, and after stating the purpose of the meeting, which was to form a brass band, it was unanimously decided to organize under the name of the North Toronto Musical Society, with S. J. Douglas, president, M. C. Clark, vice-president, W. J. LeRoux, secretary-treasurer, and an executive committee composed of Mayor Brown, R. B. Boulden, Robert Klink and H. Mair.

The "North Toronto Citizens' Band" was decided upon as the name of the organization, and while many of the parts have already been assigned, a number of vacancies are open.

The members are especially desirous that those having instruments and who were formerly connected with the old band, should ally themselves with the new organization. There is a lot of latent musical talent in North Toronto which only needs to be developed.

A regular meeting of the town council, scheduled for to-night, did not materialize owing to a number of causes, all unavoidable.
