

ARMENIANS DRIVEN OUTSIDE BOUNDARY

Frightful Conditions Prevail in Small Area Held by Them.

Tiflis, Dec. 2.—Armenian forces have been driven eastward by the Turkish Nationalists until the region they hold is entirely outside the traditional boundaries of Armenia. As a result, Armenia is reduced to a little Caucasian republic, such as was created by the Germans and Turks during the war. It comprises the districts of Erivan, Novobayazet, 30 miles to the northeast of that city, and Etschmiadzin, the ecclesiastical centre of Armenia, located about 25 miles north of Mt. Ararat.

Turkish Nationalists have occupied districts just to the west of this region, holding Karz, Alexandropol and Surmalou. Hostilities between the Armenians and Turkish Nationalists have been suspended thru intervention by the Bolshevik government. Conditions, however, are frightful in the district held by the Armenian forces. One hundred thousand refugees, in the last stages of destitution, are travelling thru the snow in all directions and the Armenian government is unable to obtain food, pending the arrival of grain promised by the Russian Bolsheviks.

The Turkish Nationalists assert they will not crush Armenia but will grant lenient terms. These terms, however, must be in conformity with Turkish aspirations, it is declared. Dr. Alexander Khattisian, Armenian premier and foreign minister, has been appointed a special plenipotentiary to arrange peace terms with the Nationalists.

The morale of Armenia's shattered army is very low, while the Turks, by contrast, are well disciplined and equipped. Reports that Soviet Russia is in disagreement with the Turkish Nationalists are accepted as true, and it is said Moscow views unfavorably the Turkish advance into Armenia.

ARRANGE MAIL DELIVERY ADDRESSED TO SAILORS

Ottawa, Dec. 2.—(By Canadian Press). Arrangements have been made by the department of the naval service for the delivery of mail addressed to officers, men and boys aboard H. M. C. ships Aurora, Patriot and Patrician, the naval vessels recently presented by Great Britain, so that relatives and friends of the many Canadians aboard these vessels of the navy will be able to communicate with their friends without trouble. As these ships will not be stationed at any one port, arrangements have been made with the postoffice department for the permanent address, care postoffice, Montreal, to be used.

LORD BESSBOROUGH DEAD; NOT LORD DESBOROUGH

London, Dec. 2.—It was the Earl of Bessborough who died at Birmingham while making a speech, and not Lord Bessborough, the noted sportsman and chairman of the chambers of commerce convention at Toronto last summer, as stated in The Times. The earl is succeeded by Viscount Duncannon, Coalition member of the house of commons for Dover. The elevation of the viscount to the house of lords will thus create a vacancy in the representation for the Dover division. Viscount Duncannon received a majority of 6,000 at the last general election.

THREE OTTAWA EMPLOYEES SAID TO HAVE STOLEN MAIL

Ottawa, Dec. 2.—Three former employees of the Ottawa postoffice charged with having robbed the mails, appeared in the police court today. The men are James Snyder, C. A. Latham, and C. W. Irish. Snyder pleaded guilty and was remanded until Tuesday for sentence. The other two men, at the request of their counsel, were remanded until December 4, without entering a plea.

Vatican Well Pleased at Prospect of French Embassy

Rome, Dec. 2.—News that the French Chamber of Deputies had voted for a re-establishment of diplomatic relations with the Holy See was received at the Vatican with the greatest satisfaction. At the Vatican it was said yesterday a harder struggle was expected in the French senate, but that re-establishment of relations would be finally approved by that body, after which France will appoint an ambassador to the Vatican, and the latter a nuncio as its representative in France.

NAME NEW MINISTERS FOR MARITIME HOUSE

Hon. R. Murray and Hon. J. F. Tweeddale Succeed Hetherington and Mercereau.

Fredericton, N.B., Dec. 2.—Hon. Robert Murray, provincial secretary-treasurer, and Hon. J. Fletcher Tweeddale, minister of agriculture, who were defeated in the general elections on October 9, tendered their resignations as ministers of the crown to his Honor Lieutenant-Governor Pugsley this afternoon.

They are to be succeeded by Hon. J. E. Hetherington, Speaker of the last legislature, who will become provincial secretary-treasurer, and David W. Mercereau, member for Sunbury, who is to be the new minister of agriculture.

REV. J. O. SPRACKLIN IN SANDWICH JAIL

Faces Preliminary Hearing on Slaying Charge—Case Goes to Superior Court.

Windsor, Ont., Dec. 2.—(Canadian Press).—Rev. J. O. L. Spracklin was taken to Sandwich jail immediately following the preliminary hearing of the charges against him in the Windsor police court. The charges of "unlawfully killing and slaying Beverley Trumble" during the course of a raid on the Chappell House at 2 a.m. of November 6, by the special license squad.

Ball application is being made by W. O. Lamarche, acting for R. L. Brackin, M.P.P., counsel for the prisoner.

Neither Spracklin, his counsel, W. H. Furlong, nor the acting prosecutor, T. G. McHugh, made any statement in court.

Contradictory Evidence. Magistrate Gundy ordered the case to go for a hearing in the superior court at the next session, stating that the charge could not be dealt with by a police magistrate. He also pointed to the contradictory evidence which had been heard at the coroner's inquest. At that time the testimony of witnesses clashed on whether or not Trumble had threatened Spracklin's life with a revolver. The revolver has never been found, and inmates of the Chappell House, which was being raided at the time of the tragedy, denied having seen any weapon. Spracklin and his squad all claimed having seen the weapon, the four officers who accompanied Spracklin claiming to have brought it back to the police station.

New Prosecutor. A letter from Attorney-General W. E. Roney, authorizing the appointment of a new crown prosecutor in the case, to replace John H. Rodd, K.C., was also read in court by Magistrate Gundy. In the letter Mr. Rodd was occasion to champion Mr. Rodd and to delicately prod Mr. Furlong's insistence that the former be replaced. The communication, however, concluded with the admission by the attorney-general that he is of the same opinion as Mr. Furlong, in that he believes an outside prosecutor should be brought in to take the case before the supreme court.

Mr. Furlong is indignant at the tone of the letter, and declares the attorney-general's attitude is unjustified.

Matter of Bail. It is expected that J. A. Stone and William Wright, who have acted until now as Spracklin's bondsmen, will again furnish bail, should the application be granted by the county judge.

PET KITTEN CAUSES BABY TO SUFFOCATE

Chatham, N. B., Dec. 2.—John H. Koether, seven months old, son of Mr. and Mrs. George M. Koether, of Round Bay, suffocated when a pet kitten climbed into his crib and went to sleep on the baby's chest.

The crib was standing on a porch. The family believe the kitten, which by the outdoor air, climbed into the crib to get warm by nestling close to the baby.

OFFICIAL ALL-DRY VOTE TO BE ANNOUNCED SOON

Ottawa, Dec. 2.—(By Canadian Press).—The official count of the recent all-dry plebiscites in Manitoba, Alberta, Saskatchewan and Nova Scotia is expected to be complete, and the results officially announced by the middle of the month.

DIES IN PENITENTIARY.

Kingston, Ont., Dec. 2.—An inmate of the Penitentiary named Low died last night in the institution after a short illness. Low was a resident of Brockville and had spent only a short time at the institution. This afternoon his body was sent to his former home in Brockville for interment.

ABANDON COMPULSORY LOAN.

London, Dec. 2.—The Queensland government has announced its decision to abandon the compulsory provisions of its proposed local loan. Referring to this decision, The Times says: "This is welcome news and shows that Queensland is beginning to realize the danger of mixing politics with finance."

BRITISH BAPTISTS RAISE \$1,250,000.

London, Dec. 2.—The Baptist Union of Great Britain has succeeded in raising a quarter of a million pounds sterling to increase minimum stipends of its missionary efforts.

WALTER R. SCACE ILL.

Brockville, Ont., Dec. 2.—Stricken with paralysis last night, Walter R. Scace, jailer of the counties jail here for the last eight years, is critically ill. For 29 years he was business manager of The Brockville Times, and previously was on The Welland Telegraph. He comes from Brantford.

SCOTTISH PROHIBITION POLL.

London, Dec. 2.—(C.A.P.)—The poll on Scottish prohibition leaves Greenock much the same as before. One ward voted for no license, another for limitation of licenses, and six for no change. Fifteen members of the House of Commons have voted the change.

BAR IMMIGRATION TO UNITED STATES

Proposed Measure Would Permit Only Blood Relatives of Prospective Citizens.

Washington, Dec. 2.—Immigration into the United States would practically be suspended for two years under a bill submitted to the house immigration committee today by its chairman, Representative Johnson of Washington. The measure would permit the admission only of blood relatives of citizens or aliens who had declared their intention of becoming naturalized, and the entry for a period of not more than six months of travelers and of "otherwise admissible" aliens from Canada, Newfoundland, Cuba and Mexico.

The bill, Mr. Johnson explained, is a tentative draft which will be the subject of committee discussions. Change, suggested by other members of committee, he said, might be incorporated in the measure. Naturalization is not dealt with in the bill, Chairman Johnson explaining that this phase of the alien question is taken care of by a bill pending before the house. The clause permitting six months' entry of aliens from Canada, Cuba and Mexico, Mr. Johnson said, is considered necessary to provide for temporary admission of workers in certain lines of employment.

Admission of blood relatives of citizens or aliens about to be naturalized would be on application to the commissioner-general of immigration, who would be instructed to permit entry only when satisfied that it would not be in violation of immigration laws and that the applicant would prove a desirable resident of the United States.

Representative Johnson said he expected the immigration bill to be ready for the house early in the session which opens next Monday.

D'ANNUNZIO STAGES COMIC OPERA WAR

Soldiers Fire Rifles at Manoeuvring Italian Fleet.

Trieste, Dec. 2.—The Italian fleet stationed at Pola steamed up the gulf of Quarnero yesterday, manoeuvring in the bay before Fiume, and then slowly passed very close to the mouth of the harbor, as in review. The fleet consisted in contrast to d'Annunzio's little fleet of one dreadnought, four destroyers and smaller craft, moored at the Fiume wharves. Some of d'Annunzio's soldiers on the shore emptied their rifles at the fleet, but no casualties resulted.

The whole manoeuvre was part of a demonstration by the Italian government for the purpose of engineering a coup d'etat it had at hand. On land, carabinieri were taking up positions along the lines of demarcation.

d'Annunzio's soldiers, who have been greatly stirred up by his appeals for the defence of Fiume, are taking the "war" situation very seriously. Their number is estimated at about 4000, including detached units of aviation, engineers, cavalry, gas battalions, air forces, armored motor cars and machine gunners.

The cutting off of communication with Fiume by both land and sea is regarded as imminent.

NORWAY LACKING FOOD OWING TO STRIKE

London, Dec. 2.—The food situation in Norway is regarded as serious owing to the railway strike in that country, says the Exchange Telegraph's Copenhagen correspondent today, quoting a despatch from Christiania.

Only one week's meat supply is available in Norway, the correspondent adds, and rumors again are current of a sympathetic strike in the coastal traffic and on the electric railways.

SOLD POISONED WHISKEY; SENTENCED TO 18 1-2 YEARS

New York, Dec. 2.—Carmine Lenzini, second to be tried of four men indicted in connection with theft and distribution of wood alcohol "whiskey" last Christmas, after 100 persons had died from drinking it in Connecticut, Massachusetts and New York, today was sentenced in the Brooklyn supreme court to 18 1-2 years in Sing Sing for manslaughter in the first degree.

Major W. M. Nickle Awarded Medaille D'Honneur

Kingston, Ont., Dec. 2.—(Special).—Major William M. Nickle, son of W. F. Nickle, has been granted the Medaille d'Honneur Avec Glorieux, "En Vermail," as published in The London Gazette, dated November 2, 1919. Major Nickle served as an officer in the 21st Battalion and was three times wounded.
