### PRINCIPAL MANUFACTORIES.

The St. Catharines Marble Works, on Queenston street, were established in 1852, and employ from 10 to 15 hands. E. Gadsby.

The St. Catharines Agricultural and Machine Works, corner of Race and Chestnut streets, have been established nine years, and employ from six to eight hands in the manufacture of agricultural implements and general machine work. C. M. Abell.

The Corset Manufactory of Mrs. E. Guthrie, in the Grand Central block, St. Paul street, has been established two years, and employs from 10 to 15 hands, turning out from \$10,000 to \$15,000 worth of corsets annually.

The St. Catharines Tannery, foot of Chestnut street, has been established nine years, and employs five hands in the manufacture of kip, calf and lace leather. W. H. McCordick.

The Cigar Manufactory of Alex. Howell, on King street, was established in 1875, employs 15 hands, and turns out 500,000 cigars annually.

The Fruit Evaporating Establishment of James Titterington, on James street, was established in August, 1880, and employs 30 hands. Capacity, 200 bushels per day.

The Phoenix Mills (flouring) at the foot of Bond street, have been established about 40 years. There are 7 runs of stones, with a capacity of 350 barrels per day. S. Neelon.

The Tannery of James Wood, on the Thorold road has been established 12 or 13 years. Five hands are employed in the manufacture of harness and upper leather.

The City Planing Mills, near the gas works, have been established six years. Twelve hands are employed in the manufacture of sash, doors, blinds, mouldings, and all description of indoor carpenter work. W. McCraney & Son.

The St. Catharines Shirt Factory, on St. Paul street, has been established seven years, and employs five or six hands. Henry Grellier.
