FISHING WITHOUT A LICENSE EXPENSIVE

St. John River Residents Paid Heavily for a Few Hours Sport.

Fredericton, July 3--(Special).--Dr. James F. Shute, brother of Arthur A. Shute of this city, was married at Lacombe, Alberta, on June 24th to Miss Martha Skinner, of that place.

John Smith and Arnold McKean of Macquarie were caught fishing salmon without a license in the St. John River yesterday and it cost them \$2.65. Upon learning that information had been laid against them, with Police Magistrate Marsh they came to the city and consulted solicitor General McLeod. He advised them to settle the matter and seek out Fishery Officer McKay, they paid a fine of \$10 each and \$2.65 costs. Residents of the St. John River between Crook's Point and Andover have been given the right to fish salmon every alternate fortnight on payment of a license fee of \$1, and the authorities are determined that they shall comply with the law.
