Captain Graham, with his steamer, visited the wreck, and says he cannot see how the Hestia got where she did after the Gannet Light was sighted, unless they mistook it for another light.

Wm. I. Whiting's Will Proven in the Probate Court Today

In the probate court this morning, the will of Wm. I. Whiting, late of New York, was proven. He left all his estate to his nephew Isaac H. Northrup of this city. The property bequeathed to Mr. Northrup consists of a lot of eight feet on the corner of St. James and Canterbury streets, a lot on the South Market Wharf, six lots on the western side of Prince William street, near Reed's Point, and a freehold lot at Tothessy, with a dwelling house. All these are subject to mortgages, the value of the property over which is placed at \$1,500. The personal estate is \$200. Mr. Northrup was sworn in as executor. The Promotion of the St. John Manager of the Union Bank of Halifax—Bank Reaching Out to West

St. John, as mentioned in the Times some days ago, is soon to lose one of its most popular citizens and business men, in the person of Charles A. Gray, manager of the Union Bank of Halifax, who has been promoted to the position of manager of the new office which will be opened in Montreal.

Mr. Gray came to St. John in July, 1907, succeeding Norman R. Burroughs, who is now manager of the Royal Bank

of Canada, in Havana, Cuba. Previous to coming to St. John, Mr. Gray was in charge of the branch in Port of Spain, Trinidad, for three years, and before that was in Windsor, N. S., for two years.

Heretofore the Union Bank has confined its activities to the maritime provinces and the West Indies, having no office further west than St. John.

The opening of a branch in Montreal indicates that the institution is reaching after more business, and intends to pursue a progressive policy in the future, probably going right through the western provinces. The officials of the bank recognize that this is Canada's growing time and that they will have to grow or else be absorbed, and apparently have determined to grow.

It is a fact that the local office, Mr. Gray will probably leave here to assume control of the larger centre about July.

During his stay in St. John Mr. Gray has made hosts of friends, and while there will be general regret at his departure, all will be pleased to know that he goes to occupy an important position and one which he will doubtless fill to the satisfaction of his principals and his clients.

He will be succeeded in the local office by E. C. Wright, for the past five years in charge of the Windsor branch. The Union Bank has been particularly fortunate in this selection, agents for St. John, as their rapidly increasing business here testifies.

NEW STORY TO

SEAMEN'S INSTITUTE

New Rooms Ready in Course of a Few Weeks—Comfort Bags in the Making Now

Work on the new story being added to the Seamen's Institute in Prince William street is being advanced as rapidly as possible, and in the course of a few weeks the rooms, which number eight or ten, will have been completed. The additional flat will be a decided improvement, and will be well equipped with many interesting and modern features in connection with a building of this nature. The apartments for the officers and engineers and the seamen are to be separate. The officers' quarters are to be spacious rooms facing the street, with a splendid view of the water front, while the rooms for the men will be situated in the rear.

Among the most notable features of the new story are a bathroom and lavatory, library, recreation room, sleeping compartments and the Nelson room. The recreation room is yet to be christened—a procedure which will cost about \$500.

The rooms set apart for sleeping will be used only by destitute seamen or sailors who have been ill or after a term of treatment in the hospital have been discharged and are physically incapable of going to sea for a time.

The ladies of the auxiliary are busy these days preparing comfort bags for the seamen and already have a large number on hand. These bags are much appreciated by the "sons of the sea," as they contain a variety of useful articles, such as writing paper, needles, thread, socks, mittens and mufflers. Any donations which will be of use to Mr. Gorboll and the ladies engaged in the work of bettering the conditions of "Jack" will be greatly appreciated.

It is probable that the ladies of the auxiliary will hold a fair in December for the purpose of raising funds.

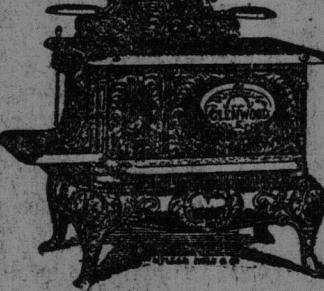
