SUPREME COUNCIL OF THE 33RD DEGREE FOR IRELAND.

To the Sov: Gr.: Inspectors General; to the Representatives of the Council of the 33rd Degree for Ireland near the Masonic Authorities of our Correspondence; and to all Masonic Bodies of our Obedience.

The S. G. Commander of the Council of the 33rd Degree of the Ancient and Accepted Rite for Ireland, on behalf of that Council, sends Greeting :

ILL.'. AND DEAR BRETHREN,

The Grand Orient of France, which is the Governing Body of the Degrees of Blue Masonry in France and the French Possessions, claims to have under its obedience several Bodies of the Higher Grades of the above mentioned Rite.

Previously to the 13th September, 1877, the Grand Orient of France recognized certain Constitutions of Freemasonry, the first Article whereof declared the Principles of Freemasonry to be the Existence of God, the Immortality of the Soul, and human solidarity (*solidarite humaine*).

It is plain that a professed Atheist or Materialist could not, consistently with hat Constitution be admitted a Freemason. But the Grand Orient of France, on
