GOOD OMENS SEEN

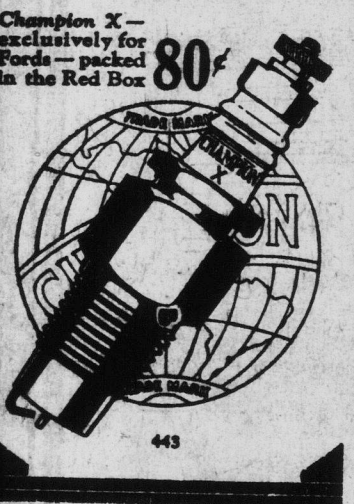

"We can assure Mr. Mackenzie King," The Spectator continues, "that despite a certain amount of foolish writing in the reactionary press of this country, the better minds throughout the United Kingdom never have been alarmed, or ever momentarily disturbed, by election slogans or invitations to us to believe that if Mr. King and his party were returned to office it would not be long before Canada would cease to belong to the Empire."

NOBODY BELIEVES IT

"Nobody here whose opinion counts has believed in the picture of Mr. King crouching, knife in hand, ready to cut the painter, and equally little importance has been attached to the timorous, though doubtless often sincere, complaint that the huge population and vast extent of the republic to the south must lead to Canada's absorption."

"All history shows the fatality of such prophecy. The only possibility of such a course of action being taken would be because of the extreme poverty of Canada, but only the wildest, most ignorant and most pessimistic dreamers can contemplate Canada as bankrupt and a wilderness of ravaging paupers. Canada's economic future is assured."

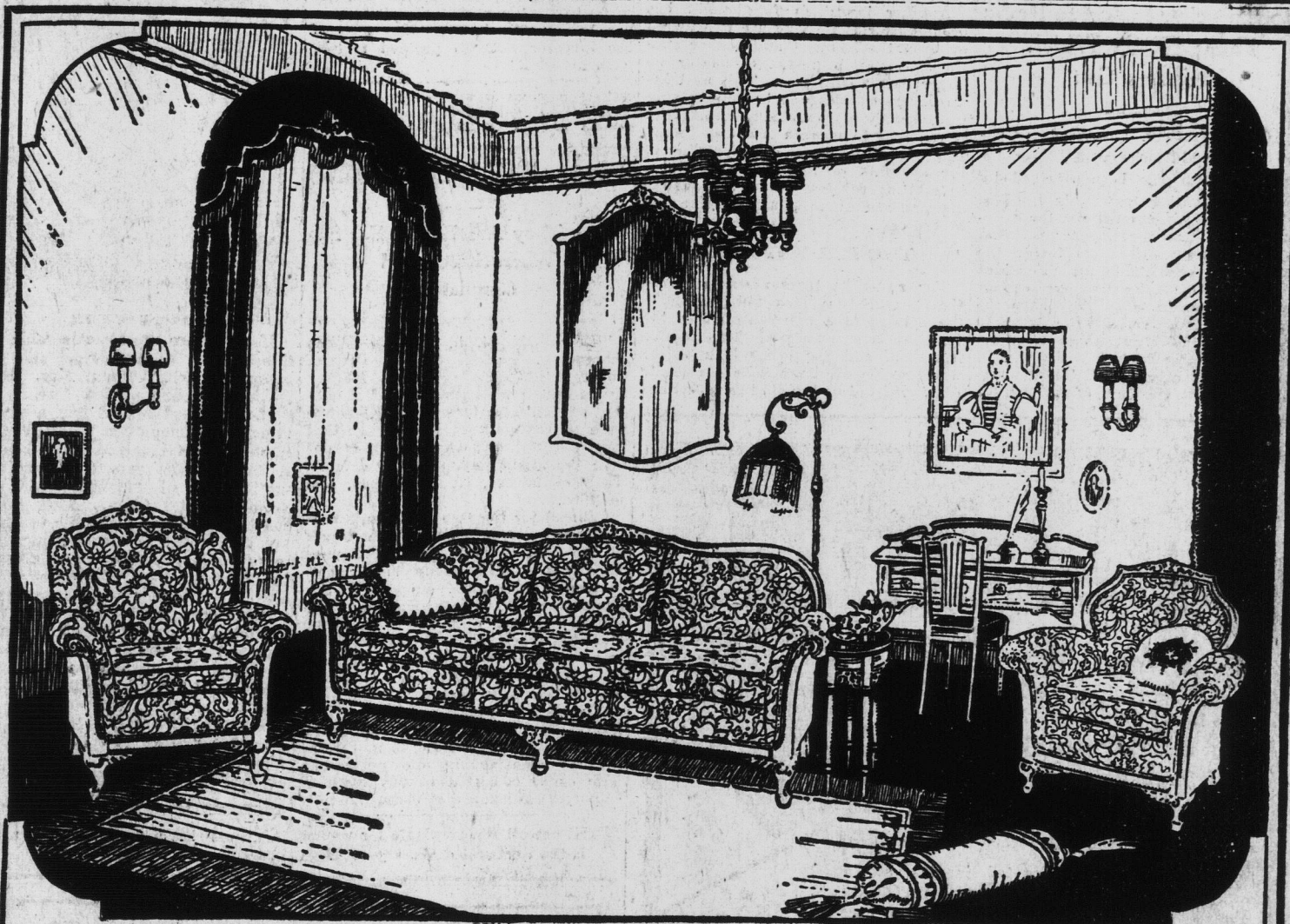
Princeton Athlete Killed In Smash-Up

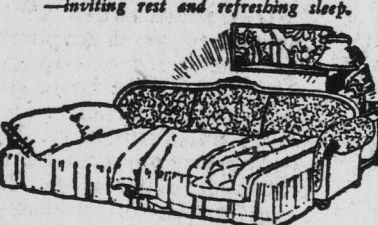
