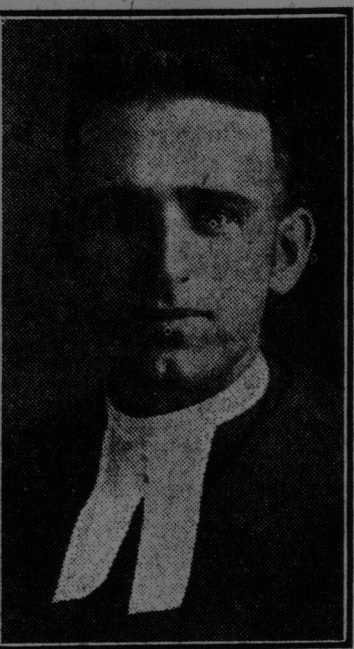

New Pastor of St. Andrew's Church and His Wife

Rev. J. S. Bonnell, newly inducted pastor of St. Andrew's Presbyterian church, is a native of Charlottetown, P. E. I. He received his education in the public schools there, going later to Prince of Wales College and then to Dalhousie University, Halifax, where in 1919 he secured the degree of Bachelor of Arts. He pursued his divinity studies at Pine Hill Theological College, Halifax, leaving there in the spring of 1922, having taken high honors and receiving a high honors diploma. For two years previous he had been in charge of the Presbyterian church at Cavendish, P. E. I., and on leaving Pine Hill he received a call there, which he accepted. He held the pastorate there until coming to St. John this week.

Gassed in War.

Rev. Mr. Bonnell enlisted as a gunner in the 8th Siege Battery from Prince Edward Island, under the command of Major Peake of Charlottetown, in 1916. At Armentieres he was severely gassed. This was the first occasion on which the use of mustard gas was common, although it had been used at Ypres three days before, and word has not reached the troops at Armentieres. He was invalided home in the spring of 1918. He returned home with the rank of acting sergeant-major. He had been recommended for a commission, but was not able to take it because he could not get back into "A" class because of the effect of the gas.

He was married on June 28 of this year to Miss Bessie Louise Carruthers of Charlottetown, a daughter of Dr. Carruthers. She was educated at Prince of Wales and Macdonald College, St. Anne de Bellevue, Que., and for two years previous to her marriage was supervisor of Women's Institutes for Prince Edward Island.

Rev. Mr. Bonnell and his wife come to St. John under auspicious circumstances and have been heartily welcomed to the city.

THEATRE PLAN FOR JAP FUND

Imperial Executive Gets a 'Phone Message From New York.

An international plan to assist in the world-wide Japanese relief organization now in process of formation in every big city was made known to Imperial Theatre executive on the long distance telephone yesterday from the offices of E. F. Albee, dean of the Theatre Managers' Association of United States and Canada, and president of the Keith interests, of which the St. John theatre is a part.

The scheme being worked out by the theatres of both countries will be somewhat along the lines employed to raise funds during the late war. Special speakers will make the appeal, and it is probable moving pictures will be employed, showing Japan in happiness and prosperity before the great catastrophe, in order that the full force of the great calamity will be brought home to everybody.

The American theatres will carry on their campaign for a week to be selected in the near future and the gross proceeds of collections will be handed over to the official headquarters of the American Red Cross. Canadian contributions will doubtless be handled through the same organization on this side of the boundary, as the first practical steps in relief of Japan have already been taken by the Canadian Red Cross through the near port of Vancouver.

The Imperial Theatre executive is awaiting further advice as to dates so that the St. John campaign may be co-ordinated with that of Upper Canadian cities and American houses. The plan is a most comprehensive one and in yesterday's telephone message it was suggested that all theatres in St. John and other Canadian cities, whether associated with the Theatre Managers' Organization or not, would probably be glad to co-operate and make the collection a truly worthy one.

REPORTED DEAL OF NASHWAAK PULP & PAPER CO.

The last issue of the Pulp and Paper Magazine has these items under the head of New Brunswick news:—"Hugh Chisholm, president of the Nashwaak Pulp and Paper Company of St. John, N. B., is now in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. The visit of Mr. Chisholm is said to be in connection with a deal which the Nashwaak interests are involved. Dame Rumor even goes so far as to say, the Nashwaak group will take over the Clackmill at Bear River and some pulpwood areas in Nova Scotia also. More pulp has been exported from Bay of Fundy ports during the present summer than ever before. Development of Digby as a pulp exportation centre has resulted in regular calls to that port. In some instances the steamers bound for English ports load part of the cargo at Digby and the balance at St. John, crossing the bay to secure the remainder."

SET CLOCKS BACK AN HOUR TONIGHT

The change from Daylight Saving time to Atlantic Standard time will be made tonight at midnight. The hands of all watches and clocks which have been recording Daylight Time should be set back one hour on Saturday night. In the case of clocks which strike the hours, the change of time should be made by setting the clock forward eleven hours to avoid trouble with the mechanism.

CROWDED OVER BY FOREIGN CAR

Driver in Blagdon Fatal Accident Testifies at Inquest.

The inquest into the accident which resulted in the death of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Bangs and their son, Esmond, last Monday night near Blagdon, was begun last night before Coroner Dr. A. A. Lewin, Welsford. Three witnesses, R. C. McLean, M. W. Parke and Harrison Driscoll, were examined and the enquiry postponed until next Tuesday evening.

Mr. McLean testified that the party were proceeding to their homes in Fredericton when they were near the Blagdon bridge saw a large foreign car coming toward them. This car was crowded the road and he pulled over to the right side of the road. As the car passed he, feeling that he was too far over to the right for safety, turned quickly to the left and before he or anyone in the crowd it the auto mobile was through the rail of the bridge and into the gully below.

M. W. Parke and Harrison Driscoll told of the work of rescue and removal of the bodies of the dead. Mr. Parke arrived on the scene a short time after the accident and helped to lift the car off the injured party and in conveying them to the house where they were cared for. He also telephoned to the city for the ambulance. Later, on the direction of the coroner, he helped remove the bodies of those who were killed.

It was a most innocent, peaceful, law-abiding little bundle of humanity that was placed in Miss White's care early in the afternoon. Mother had arrived. She took her little offspring in her arms. A few unintelligible words into the cliff ear and slowly the brakes went on. The howl reduced itself to a cry and the cry to a spasmodic whinge and, finally, the tear-filled eyes brightened and peace and quiet reigned once more.

VISIT MARKED BY HAPPY RE-UNION

Three Classmates of 1863 at Kings, Sole Survivors, Meet.

Rev. W. B. Armstrong has returned from Windsor, N. S., where he spent the summer. Earlier in the season he met with an accident when he was knocked down by an automobile at Rousesay and his foot was run over. He is still suffering from the effects of the accident, but is able to be up and about. During his stay in Windsor he found the residents were greatly regretting the removal of King's College from the town. Mr. Armstrong is himself a graduate of King's and a loyal son of his Alma Mater, who is sorry that King's should remove from Windsor and to some extent sink its identity in the larger university at Halifax. Mr. Armstrong is a graduate of the class of 1863, of which there are now only three survivors. The other two are Judge Townsend of Wolfville and Rev. Dr. Bullock of Windsor. The three former classmates met in Wolfville this summer and had great pleasure in recalling their college days.

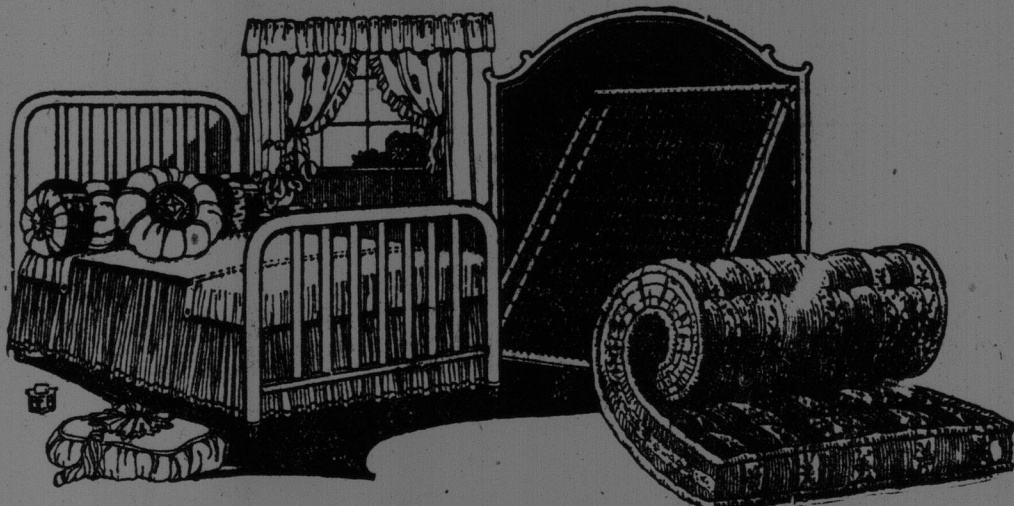
