

London, Feb. 15—Premier Lloyd nons tonight that the government had

This decision, the premier added, had been taken in the interests of the re-establishment of law and order in Ireland.

Lloyd George explained that there was enough in the report to satisfy the government that there had been acts in viorenment that there had been acts in viorent that there had been acts in viorent it was impossible to identify the individuals responsible for the destruction. "Furthermore, certain civilians of Cork, from whom the government is anxious to have evidence, have fied to the United States."

"The Sinn Feiners would not surrender their arms," he declared, "and from that it was clear that they had not abandoned the idea of securing the independence of Ireland by force of arms. Until they do abandon that idea there will be no peace in Ireland."

Alluding to the Mallow shooting, he said the railwaymen thus far had failed to come forward with testimony as to who was guilty, and he added, "we are not going to submit to threats of a strike." The government was willing to guarantee an inquiry if the railwaymen were ready to co-operate.

The Pas, Man, Feb. 15.—The story of an unsuccessful fight against death from scurvy by A. O. Reinhart of Duluth, who left here in August, 1919, for a trap line on barren lands, 200 miles from the nearest trading post, has just been reported to the provincial police here. It was not until October last that two was not until October last that two was found in the shack. Unable to move out of bed his fires went out and gradually his water supply became exhausted or frozen and he slowly perished from disease, thirst and frost.
