GO UP FOR TRIAL
Moncton, July 2.—In the police court this morning Mike Bonaferrre and Tony Rinaldi, Italians, charged with having robbed a fellow countryman, Ralph Viano, of \$150 on Sunday night in Moncton and who were arrested at Rothesay by the St. John police, were committed for trial at Dorchester. Detective Patrick Biddiscombe, of St. John, who arrested them. When searched they had in their possession \$198, there being \$140 on one prisoner and \$50 on the other. He said that both men gave him fictitious names.

CORN AND OATS AT HIGHEST FIGURES
Chicago, July 2.—Both corn and oats today touched the highest prices yet this season. Excessive heat, coupled with lack of rain, had much to do with broadening out of activity of buyers and lifting values. Continued record-breaking upturns in the hog. Opening prices, which ranged from 3-4 to 1-3-8 higher, with Sept. at \$1.79 1-2 to \$1.90 and Dec. at \$1.26 to \$1.35, were followed by additional gains.

Oats kept on the ascent with corn, closing September at 70 to 70-3-4, the market went up still higher. Provisions were hoisted by the influence of hogs and grain. Trade was fairly active.

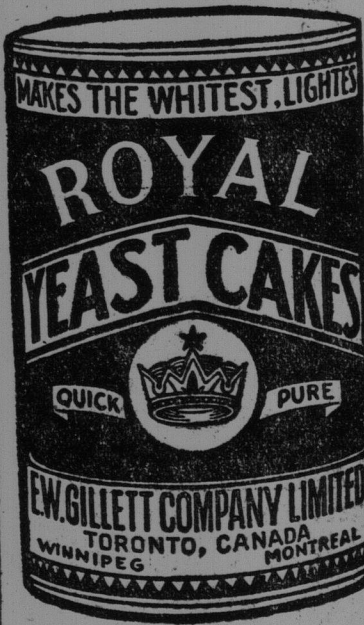

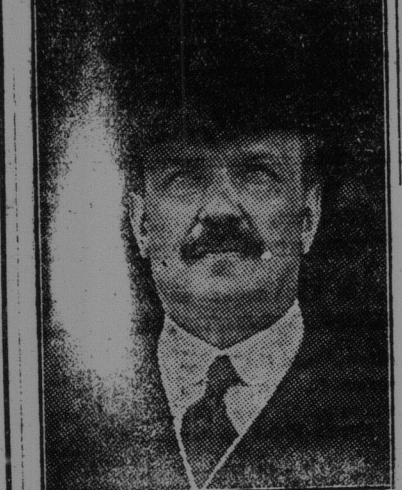
