CORN AND OATS AT

HIGHEST FIGURES

Chicago, July 2—Both corn and oats today touched the highest prices yet this season. Excessive heat, coupled with lack of rain, had much to do with broadening out of activity of buyers and lifting values. Continued record-breaking upturns in the hog market formed another bullish factor. Opening prices, which ranged from 3-4 to 1 3-8 higher, with Sept. at \$1.79 1-2 to \$1.90 and December \$1.55 to \$1.59, were followed by additional gains.

Oats kept on the ascent with corn. After opening 1-4 to 3-8 to 1 1-8 up, including September at 70 to 70 3-4 the market went up still higher.

Provisions were hoisted by the influence of hogs and grain. Trade was fairly active.




