THE BOARD OF TRADE
R. E. Armstrong, secretary of the board of trade, was at his desk again this morning after attending the meetings of the maritime board in Moncton. Mr. Armstrong said that there were some very interesting and important papers and discussions presented at the meeting and he looked for an increased interest in the maritime body. The new president, he said, intended to make regular tours of the various local boards to keep them in touch with the activities of the central organization.
THOUSAND MILE MOTOR TRIP.
Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Wilcox, their daughter Gladys and son George, and Roy Flemming of this city arrived home yesterday after motoring more than 1,000 miles through the eastern provinces. They went from St. John to Moncton, then to New Glasgow, then to Port Mulgrave, from there to Sydney, then to Port Morien, from there to Louisbourg and back to St. John. They speak well of the roads from here to Port Mulgrave but say that the route to Sydney they were none too good.

CUSTOMS REGULATIONS
In connection with the customs embargo on wheat, the department of customs has issued a memorandum stating that the law did not apply to bread, which can be exported, and imported without an individual license. Likewise, wheat flour, bran and shorts may be exported in retail quantities along the border, provided that the proper entry is made with the customs and the entry marked with the reference of the memorandum. This however, does not apply to wheat. Dealers are thus allowed to export across the border wheat flour, bran and shorts in wagon loads for retail consumers.
MOREHOUSE-McLAUGHLIN.
At the residence of the officiating clergyman, Rev. George Morley, of the Queen Square Methodist church, Miss Alethia McLaughlin, eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. D. A. Her present was a beautiful Italian cameo ring with appropriate engraving. DEATH OF J. P. BAWN
J. P. Bawn whose death is announced today was a veteran of the Imperial and Canadian forces. He served in India and other parts of the British Empire in the British cavalry and in Canada in the artillery. He had seen considerable war service in India and South Africa and tried to do his bit in the home service during the great war but his age prevented him from going overseas. He leaves one son, W. J. P. Bawn of Eastmount, St. John county and a brother, Wm. Bawn, both of whom have recently returned from France where they served with the 4th Siege Battery. Several sisters and many relatives also live in this city. Mr. Bawn has been a member of Marlborough Lodge, Sons of England for several years. His occupation was connected mostly with the grain mills of western Canada. The military authorities and Great War Veterans will probably attend to the funeral arrangements with the Sons of England.
