CUSTOMS REGULATIONS
In connection with the recent embargo on wheat, the department of customs has issued a memorandum stating that the law did not apply to bread, which can be exported, and imported without an individual license. Likewise, wheat flour, bran and shorts may be exported in retail quantities along the border, provided that the proper entry is made with the customs and the entry marked with the reference of the memorandum. This however, does not apply to wheat. Dealers are thus allowed to export across the border wheat flour, bran and shorts in wagon loads for retail consumers.


