BOSTON AND ST. JOHN TAXATION.

Referred two or three days ago, to the attempt of the St. John Globe to induce its readers to believe the taxation was higher in St. John than it is in Boston, and we made some comment on the Globe's article at the time.

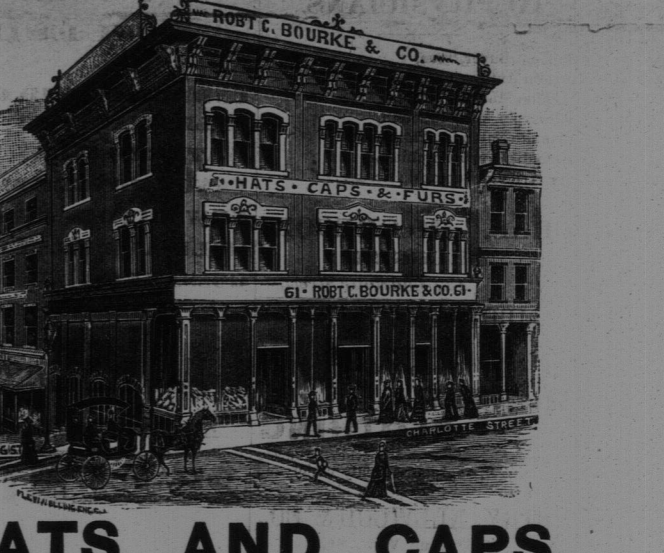
