SPECIAL MEETING
To Labor Bodies in Toronto and vicin-
ity.

Brothers and Sisters Greeting—The
Joint Committee, composed of repre-
sentatives from this Council and the
Sectional Councils, which met in
March, 1901, to formulate a plan of
amalgamation, so that organized la-
bor may have a Grand Central Coun-
cil, has reported to this Council that
the plans of amalgamation, as
submitted to a referendum vote of all
labor bodies in Toronto and vicinity,
by the Joint Committee, have been
endorsed by a very large majority of
the local bodies.

Therefore the Toronto T. and L.
Council, as the Parent Central Coun-
cil, do herewith notify all labor bod-
ies in Toronto and vicinity that the
proposed amalgamation will take
place at the regular meeting of the
Toronto T. and L. Council to be held
in Richmond Hall, June 12th, and we
request all bodies not now affiliated
to forward their delegates creden-
tials to the secretary on or before
June 12th, so that they may be en-
titled to take part in forming the
new Constitution and By-laws of the
Toronto District Labor Council,
which will be submitted by the Re-
vision Committee on the above date.

The basis of representation shall
be as follows: Trades Unions, Local
Assemblies of the Knights of Labor
and Federal Unions, three delegates
for each hundred members or under,
and one for each additional fifty or
majority fraction thereof. Allied,
Amalgamated and Federated Coun-
cils, Central Labor Union and Dis-
trict Assemblies of the Knights of
Labor, three delegates each.

All bodies represented at the vari-
ous Sectional Councils shall be re-
presented at the Toronto District La-
bor Council and vice versa. If said
Sectional Council exists. All Section-
al Councils shall be exempt from per
capitation tax.
Bodies already affiliated with the
T. and L. Council are requested to see
if their delegates seats have become
vacant through non-attendance of
meetings, and if so to send in new
credentials, otherwise they will have
no voice in the proceedings.

Don't forget the date, June 12th.
We remain yours fraternally on be-
