

OPPOSITION GAIN.

Mr. Templeman Polls a Splendid Vote Against Col. Prior.

Lack of Organization in Some Divisions Lost the Liberals the Fight.

Striking Contrast Between the Result of Yesterday's and the Last Election.

Although defeated, the opponents of the Dominion government are well pleased with the result of yesterday's election. The figures 1567 for Col. Prior and 1440 for Mr. Templeman are a striking contrast to the figures of five years ago, when Col. Prior received 1088 votes and Mr. Templeman 449.
