QUEENSTOWN DOES NOT WANT TO LOSE WHITE STAR LINERS

Unrest in Ireland is on the increase—The Progress of Education Strikingly Set Forth by John Burns—National Art Gallery is Improving.

DUBLIN, April 20.—Unrest in Ireland is believed to be increasing. By way of illustrating this several incidents which have occurred recently and within an incredibly short space of time are cited. A political demonstration reminiscent of the most exciting of the Land League days was made the other Sunday at the Ardagh Roman Catholic Chapel near Ballina. Co. Mayo, against a farmer named Patrick Keane.

Keane and other farmers recently took portions of Cranagh Farm against the wishes of the United Irish League and since then the hostility towards him has been growing. Matters reached a climax on the Sunday in question when Keane and a number of his friends were met at the chapel gates by a large crowd of people who refused to permit them to pass into the building to attend services.

"No grabbers here!" and "Away with them!" the crowd shouted and Keane and his friends were forced to seek safety. They were pursued but were not overtaken. Resolutions have been passed by meetings of the United Irish League held throughout North Mayo calling on shopkeepers and others not to supply the "grabbers" with goods of any description. As a result of these tactics many of the farmers have been unable to enter upon the farms for which they are paying rent.
