FINED \$175.90 FOR SELLING ALONG G.T.P.

Saloon Keeper Pays Up but His Bartender Has to Go to Jail

TRIED BEFORE FARRIS

MONCTON, N. B., Aug. 18.—Nicholas P. Dascall, an Austrian, living at camp No. 2 on the G. T. P. construction, was before Commissioner Farris in the police court this afternoon on three charges of keeping intoxicating liquor for sale. He was convicted in all three cases and fined fifty dollars and costs in each case. The total fine was \$175.90, which was paid. Simeon Hustina, another Austrian, who was a bartender at Dascall's, was charged with selling intoxicants along the G. T. P. Railway. He was also tried before Commissioner Farris and fined fifty dollars on all three cases. He was unable to pay the fine, which amounted to \$175.90, and commitments have been issued and he will be taken to Dorchester jail tomorrow to serve three months on each conviction or nine months in all. These are the first cases brought by Commissioner Farris here.

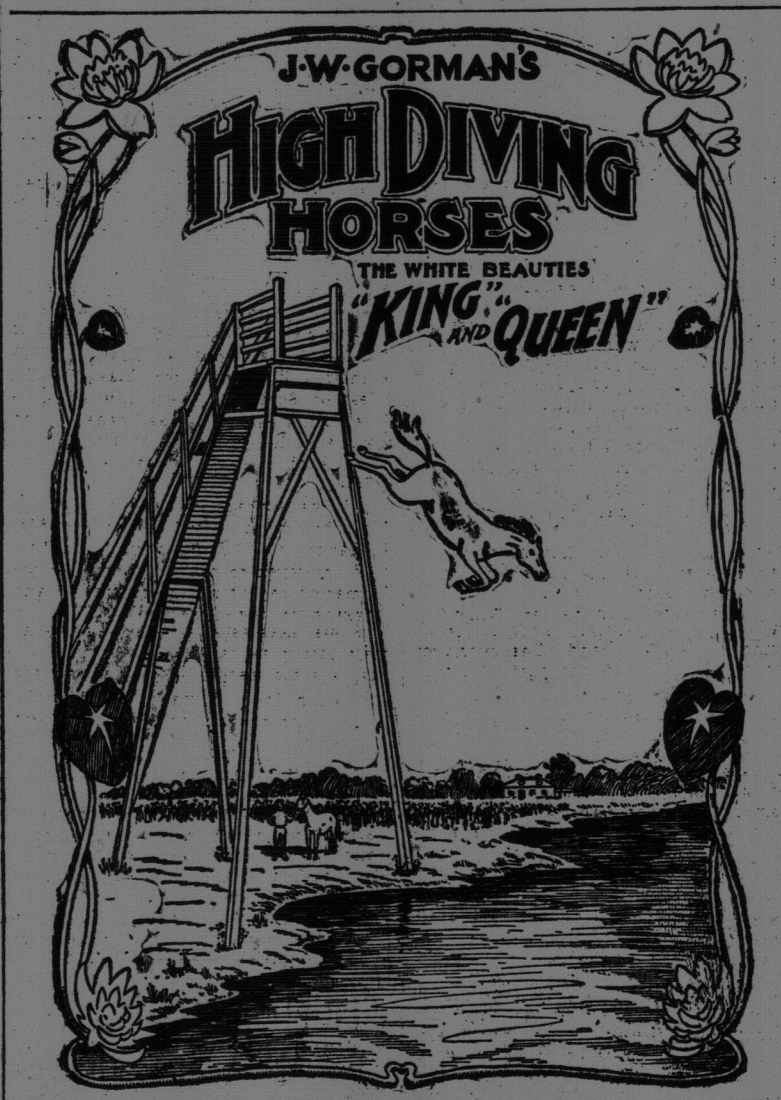

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THREE GALLANT FIRE LADDIES LOSE THEIR LIVES IN LONDON

Flour of Building Gives Way Under Men Precipitating Them to the Flames in the Basement Beneath — Fire Chief is Among Those Dead.

LONDON, Ont., Aug. 18.—A terrible accident occurred here late this afternoon in which it is certain that three gallant fire fighters lost their lives. Shortly before six o'clock fire broke out in the building on Dundas street occupied by the Westman Hardware Company. In half an hour Fire Chief Clark, firemen Wane and Sergt. Cook, assisting the fire fighters. Three others are badly injured.
