IN LIQUOR TRAFFIC United States Circuit Court Decides

Against Appeal of South Carolina Dispensary Commission

RICHMOND, Va., Sept. 16—The United States Circuit Court of Appeals in a decision handed down yesterday, sustained the opinion of Judge J. C. Pritchard in the famous case of Fleischmann Company and others against the South Carolina dispensary commission. holding in effect that a state cannot conduct liquor traffic, that being a private business. The opinion was written by Judge James E. Boyd, of Greensboro, N. C., and concurred in by his associates, Judge Edmund Waddhill and Chief Justice Fuller. The opinion consumed more than forty pages of closely typewritten matter, a great part of which is devoted to a statement of facts. In the opinion, Judge Boyd states in part:
