NEWS SUMMARY.

Robert Olsen, known as "Buck," has been committed by the St. John's magistrate for trial on the charge of killing policeman Joseph E. Steadman at Moncton.

Mr. MacLean, M. P., publisher of The World, Toronto, has been committed for trial on a charge of criminally libelling M. C. Cameron, ex-M. P.

On Tuesday last Alexander Lawson, editor of the Yarmouth Herald, entered upon his sixtieth year of active newspaper work.

From Winnipeg it is reported that at a meeting held last week the Catholics decided to maintain separate schools, despite the decision of the English Privy Council compelling them to support the public schools.

Mr. William J. Moore jumped into a lagoon at Island Pier, Toronto, Monday to save her boy who had fallen in. The boy was saved but the mother was drowned.

The sum of almost \$40,000 is Montreal's contribution to the St. John's Relief Fund. Subscriptions are now all in, the money and supplies have been sent to the sufferers, and the work of the local relief committee is concluded.

The charred remains of James Anderson, proprietor of Palestine Brewery, Barrie, Ont., were found in the ashes of his barn on his farm, having been struck by lightning and burned. It is supposed he took refuge in the barn from the storm and was rendered insensible by the shock.

A petition was received on Saturday at the Secretary of State's Department, asking for the repeal of the Canada Temperance Act in Northumberland, New Brunswick. It bears the necessary signatures to permit an Order in Council being passed, allowing a vote to be taken on the matter.

It is understood that the departments of customs and inland revenue at Ottawa, are in possession of all names of parties in Quebec interested in smuggling whiskey and other liquors on the river St. Lawrence, and that the government intend to prosecute all three men as soon as the chain of evidence is complete.

The escaped suspect, "Jim," the confederate of Olsen or "Buck," and concerned in the Steadman murder, was arrested at a place called Bass River, near Harcourt station on Friday, and brought to Moncton. He is now in jail. He was arrested by ex-policeman Peter Carroll, of Pictou, in company with D. M. Wilbur, special constable of Moncton.

The will of the late John Roberts of Ottawa, druggist, was probated Thursday. His net estate worth \$519,000. He left \$40,000 to Queen's University Kingston; \$10,000 to the Protestant hospital; \$5,000 to the Orphan's Home; \$5,000 to the Old Man's Home; \$2,000 to St. Andrew's church. The balance of the estate goes to relatives in Scotland and the United States. The Ontario government receives 5 per cent. of all the bequests save those for charities.

On Saturday, the 6th inst., about noon, Sir Richard, Bart., left Kingston, Ont., in a skiff to row to his country house on the St. Lawrence, a few miles down. When rounding Point Frederick he was caught in a terrific squall, which was accompanied by hail and torrents of rain, and his boat was capsized. Sir Richard was thrown out. The accident was witnessed by the men of "A" battery at the barracks, and Major Drury and Capt. Gaudet hurried to the rescue of Sir Richard, who clinging to the overturned boat tenaciously, and was in the water nearly half an hour, the storm pealing fiercely about him. He was completely exhausted when rescued.

Dr. Edward H. Leger, M. P., for Kent county, died in his home at Grand Digue, on the 8th inst. Deceased was first returned to parliament at the election in 1890 to fill the vacancy caused by the elevation of P. A. Landry to a county court judgeship. Parliam. duties were before the session, but Dr. Leger was again successful at the general election. He sat one session and went to Ottawa at the beginning of the last session, but was unable to take his seat. The dread disease, consumption, had taken firm hold of him and he retired to New Brunswick in June to settle up his affairs and die. Deceased was only 27 years and 15 days old and was very popular.

The French forces have begun hostilities against the Dahomeans and bombarded all points on the coast held by the latter. The French are burning villages seven miles in the interior.

A Constantinople despatch of August 11, says At Platana, August 7, 15,000 persons detained at the lazaretto by cholera regulations attempted to break the sanitary cordon. It was necessary to order a battalion of troops to fire on the crowd. Seven were killed and many wounded. The people then fled terror-stricken back to the lazaretto.

A St. Petersburg despatch says: Advice from the Crimea and the Caucasus state that the cholera is decreasing in violence. In northern and central Russia, however, the disease is increasing and in Moscow 25 more factories have been closed on account of the plague. The lower classes do not take willingly to the attempts to improve the city's sanitary condition.

According to recent despatches the ravages of cholera in Russia have become frightful, and the disease is con-

stantly spreading. It has reached the capital, and St. Petersburg is said to be in a panic. The rich, who are able to get away, are flying to healthier resorts, and merchants are closing their shops. The governor of the city has issued a proclamation begging the people to be calm, and giving directions as to preventive measures. Advice from Moscow state that the panic there is on the increase, notwithstanding the efforts of the authorities to suppress any general evidence of the spread of cholera and of popular terror.

United States.—There were five suicides at St. Louis on Tuesday.

The Market Record estimates that Minnesota and the Dakotas will raise 135,000,000 bushels of wheat this year if the weather continues favorable.

A St. Louis, Mo. despatch says: It is stated in Roman Catholic circles here as a constant theme at the next meeting of the consistory the Pope will make Archbishop Ireland, of St. Paul, a member of the College of Cardinals.

The \$10,000 verdict received by Rev. W. W. Downes, in the supreme court, Boston, a few weeks ago, in the suit against Rufus K. Noyes and others, was set aside by Judge Sherman and a new trial ordered, on the ground that the verdict was against the evidence and instructions given to the jury by the court at the trial.
