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THREE WAYS TO TRANSFER HITCHE WATED TO TRANSFERT HERE are suggestions for transferring the pattern before you to any material before working. method. This is successful when the material is thin, like linen, batiste, et. Pin the sheet of paper and the disgn. The impression will be left in fine lines and will last until worked. This method is successful on heavy material together and hold them up against the glass of a window. With a sharp pencil draw on the material. the design, which can be easily seen through the goods. If one-half of the design only be given, unpin the paper and turn the other side to the fabric. The strong light behind will make it plain. If you have carbon paper, you should place the sheet
