they exposed themselves unnecessarily. It appears from statements made by prisoners taken that the Turks did not at first realize their inferiority. The government of Constantinople and the local authorities had installed in them the conviction that Italy was an insignificant country and weaker than Greece.
When they saw the imposing fleet assembled off the coast they were assured by their officers that the vessels were not Italian but British warships which had been ordered by Tripoli to prevent its occupation by the Italians. Notwithstanding this deception and the subsequent disillusionment the Turkish gunners responded bravely to the attack and made a good fight considering the equipment at their disposal.

British Steamer Seized.
Salonika, European Turkey, Oct. 6.—The Turkish battleship Fezh-J-Bu-lean held up and searched the British steamer Orchis and finding forty barrels of powder on board brought the vessel here as a prize of war.

An Appeal to King George.
Constantinople, Oct. 6.—At a meeting held today in the Mosque of St. Sophia, a telegram of protest against Italy's declaration of war on Turkey was formulated and sent to all the parliaments of the world, peace and arbitration societies, universities, socialist organizations and The Hague peace tribunal. The telegram says the occupation of Tripoli is unjustified and that Italy is unworthy of a place among the great powers. It asks whether western civilization has considered the effect upon the eastern mind of Italy's brigandage.

ELECTORS JEERED IN GAGETOWN

The Peanut Colonel Practically Driven From Gagetown Court House by Sunbury-Queens Electors -- A Fuller Report of Thursday's Proceedings -- Mr. Smith's Fine Speech.

Gagetown, Oct. 6.—So great is the feeling which has been worked up in Queens and Sunbury over the exposure of the nefarious and corrupt methods practiced by Colonel McLean's organized gang of bribers in the recent election that, although the Colonel was declared elected here yesterday by Returning Officer Dykeman at the close of the much adumored declaration of the proceedings, the member elect for the constituency could not obtain a hearing from the electors who were in derision as he stood at the court house endeavoring to make a speech.

When Mr. Dykeman, the returning officer, opened the proceedings, several witnesses were called to explain the mistakes in connection with the marking up of the returns from a number of the polls. Among the witnesses examined were Robert Mott, poll clerk at Cambridge; James Power, deputy returning officer at Northfield, and Col. Alexander, deputy returning officer at Gladstone.

About the only thing developed by the evidence apart from the explanations offered in regard to the irregularities in making up the official statement of the votes cast, was an admission by James Power, deputy returning officer for Northfield, that he had allowed one man to vote on the certificate of the secretary-treasurer of the county, though the returning officer, Mr. Dykeman, had issued instructions to all the deputies to not allow anybody to vote on such certificates.

Colonel McLean then declared elected with a majority of 10. After the declaration Col. McLean mounted the platform in the court house and, amid a disconcerting silence, made a speech. He said: "Mr. returning officer, I do not intend to take up any time. I simply wish to thank you for declaring me elected." Then he sat down and he expected any applause or cheers, he was sadly disappointed. Probably his failure to thank anybody but the returning officer disgruntled even his supporters. At any rate he got no cheers or applause.

Fine Reception for Mr. Smith.
Luther B. Smith, the Conservative candidate, in rising to return his thanks, received an unexpected ovation. He said: "I am glad to have this opportunity of thanking my friends for the support given me at the election. It was not a defeat; it was a victory. I believe the seat honestly and fairly belongs to me. If I did not think I should have been elected, I would have declined the support of my friends."

The Duke and Duchess bade the tenderest farewells to the Princess Patricia and Prince Arthur. The Princess Louise, the Duke and Duchess and other members of royalty were present to say good bye. There were also three officers in their gold lace and plumes, but otherwise there was no parade of pomp or power.
Among the Canadians present with whom the duke had friendly words were W. L. Griffith, representing the Conservative government; J. G. Colmer, representing the Canadian Club; the association of influential Anglo-Canadians beautiful baskets of fruit and flowers had been sent to the Empress of Ireland for the duchess. Lady and Miss Helen Kirkpatrick; P. C. Larkin, Canadian members of the Imperial Trade Commission; H. G. D'Elgin, representing the Canadian Pacific Railway; Scott Griffin, representing the Grand Trunk Railway; H. G. D'Elgin, representing the Bank of Montreal; Mr. Ash, representing the Union Bank of Canada; and Hon. J. H. Turner, agent general of British Columbia.
There were also present many distinguished Englishmen, including the Duke of Argyll, Lord William Seymour, Lord Bessborough, Hon. Richard Harcourt, colonial secretary.

The outgoing premier appeared to be in high spirits and was chatting gaily with Mr. Patterson and MacKenzie King. The newspaper men gathered outside the room he cheerfully announced his intention of visiting Earl Grey in the afternoon. He was full of life and with a brief "good bye boys" he entered his cab and drove home.
Shortly after 3 o'clock Sir Wilfrid Laurier drove up to Rideau Hall. He was immediately ushered into Lord Grey's presence and the formality of the resignation took but a minute. Then the outgoing premier chatted with the King's representative for some time and took his farewells.

Mr. Borden Summoned.
At 4:30 Arthur Sladen, Lord Grey's private secretary, called up Mr. Borden on the telephone and asked if it would be convenient for him to wait upon the Governor at 6 o'clock. Then the formal message was sent over by hand and Mr. Borden was ready for the final act in the drama.
Just before 6 o'clock, Mr. Borden passed on the door of his residence on Wurttemberg street and entered the waiting cab. Mrs. Borden smilingly watched him leave, and Hon. Frankways and the carriage went by and said "Good luck Sir." "Thank you John," was Mr. Borden's smiling reply as the cab whirled away toward Rideau Hall.

New Cabinet Monday.
Now Mr. Borden has formally accepted the task, matters will move swiftly. The official slate will be given out on Monday, but your correspondent is able to give the following lineup as indicated tonight.
R. L. Borden, Premier.
J. D. Hazen of New Brunswick for Maritime Provinces.
Quebec, Messrs. Doherty, Monk, Perley and Fellebert.
Wilfrid Nantel of Terrebonne, without portfolio.

Dr. Roche for Manitoba.
Robert Rogers for Saskatchewan.
Martin Burrell for British Columbia.
Senator Loughheed for Alberta without portfolio.

There is likely to be a shakeup in the distribution of portfolios. Thus Mr. Foster is generally slated for Secretary of State and Minister for External Affairs, while Marine may go to British Columbia. Mr. Doherty is conceded to have the right of way to the portfolio of Justice.
In a few days the ex-ministers will have scattered to all points of the compass. Sir Fred Borden has sold his residence. Mr. Fielding will continue to reside here for some time. Monday will see the official list of the men who will assist Mr. Borden in the government of Canada.

MANUAL TO TRY AGAIN FOR CROWN

Madrid, Spain, Oct. 6.—The Portuguese government admits that royalist disturbances are in progress in northern Portugal near Spanish frontier. Beyond the interference of the consular authorities there is great difficulty in learning the exact situation where the monarchists are operating, because of the distance of those points from the railways and telegraph stations.
The government is also much in the dark.
According to messages received here from Lisbon from persons who may know there is nothing of a serious character transpiring, at the same time Royalist agents and sympathizers are spreading the news of the triumphal march of the monarchist troops towards Oporto.

Royalties Defeated.
Lisbon, Oct. 6.—A band of royalists has been defeated in a fight with the republican troops near Braganza in Traz-os-Montes, the northeast most province of Portugal. It is rumored that a royalist column of Vanhaes 14 miles west of Braganza is surrounded by republicans.
