MR. HAZEN THE RIGHT MAN FOR MARINE AND FISHERIES

Weir Owners and Weir Fishermen's Union, of Charlotte County, at their Annual Meeting Passed Resolution of Confidence in Hon. Mr. Hazen as Minister of Marine and Fisheries.

Special to The Standard.—At the annual meeting of the Weir Owners and Weir Fishermen's Union of Charlotte County, held in St. George's today a resolution was adopted stating that the action of the late government in transferring the control of the fishery protection branch to the fisheries department was a mistake.

On motion of Capt. Chas. Johnson and Geo. M. Byron, a resolution was passed by the union that Hon. J. D. Hazen be appointed to the position of Minister of Marine and Fisheries.

A Fairly Successful Year.—In opening the meeting the president, J. A. Belyea, expressed regret that the weather had prevented a larger attendance.

The report of the secretary treasurer showed that the union had a substantial balance on hand.

The Seining Question.—Your committee have great pleasure in reporting a fairly successful year in the seining business.

Your committee deplore the prevalence of the seining which they regret to report was carried on, particularly in the upper part of the Bay of Fundy, to a great extent than usual.

Your committee have heard with great satisfaction that a large canning factory will be erected at Chatham, which will not only provide an additional market for our fish, but will encourage other investment in the canning industry in Canada.

Confidence in Hon. Mr. Hazen.—Your committee also feel that although the general election through out the Dominion resulted in a change of the government, and that there is now a new head to the department of Marine and Fisheries, they have no reason to believe that, if possible, greater care will be taken by the present minister of Fisheries to preserve, protect and develop not only our herring fisheries, but our fisheries of all kinds, and that he will quickly realize that the fisheries of Canada are its greatest asset.

Your committee wish the President and members a Happy New Year.

Election of Officers.—The next order of business was the election of officers for the year: Angus Holt moved, and Geo. Byron seconded, that J. A. Belyea be re-elected president, and this was carried unanimously.

Fixing of Prices.—A short discussion followed on the question of fixing a price for herring and protecting the small herring. Samuel Craig contended that the union should have fixed a price last year as prices fluctuated and some fishermen at certain times did not get a fair return for their labor.

Renewal of lease was granted W. E. Scully for lot No. 568 Rodney street Adams' ward. The committee appointed to deal with the application of Chas. P. Baker to purchase the Thompson house and stable on Bay Street No. 468, submitted their report recommending that the price be fixed at \$1000.
