TELLS OF Y. M. C. A. WORK IN THE ORIENT
R. L. Ewing, of Madras Branch, Addresses Members of Local Institution—Progress Made Among Heathen.

R. L. Ewing, the secretary of the Young Men's Christian Association at Madras, India, was the speaker at the special meeting in the Y. M. C. A. yesterday afternoon when about fifty of the members heard an excellent and comprehensive address on missionary and association work in India, but especially in the residence of Madras. Unlike some returned missionaries, Mr. Ewing did not tell of the horrors of idol worship, but spoke of the needs of the growing church in India and the great work which is being carried on not only by the missionaries and associations, but by the natives themselves.
