New York, Sept. 28—The details of a scheme where the National City Bank of this city was recently victimized by a clever forger, came out today. The forger presented a bogus check bearing the name of a well known stock exchange firm and received in return securities valued at

The bank on which the broker's check was drawn is one with which Pearl & Co. never had an account, so the forgery was not discovered until the check had passed through the clearing house exchanges, when it was promptly branded as fictitious. A private detective agency was called in and transfer of the securities was at once stopped. The detectives intimate that they have a clue to the identity of the forger, who is believed to have had one or more accomplices. The firm of Pearl & Co. consists of Dyer Pearl and E. F. Slaback. Mr. Pearl is now in Europe. Both members of the firm own stock exchange seats, and their operations on the board have at various times been very extensive. cent. "The changes in the higher administrations of the national forces of Canada and Australia have brought about something like a divorce between the imperial and colonial military organizations. It is not necessary to emphasize the disadvantages even the danger of such a tendency. The whole question of imperial unity is seriously affected by it."
