## CONDENSED NEWS, LOCAL AND GENERAL

Congratulations to Rev. George Gough of Scotch Ridge, on his marriage to Miss Bessie Armstrong, of Warrice (N. B.), on Wednesday, Sept. 8, Rev. E. B. Wilkie of St. Stephen, officiating, assisted by Rev. K. MacLennan.

Rev. Prof. W. G. Watson, of Mount Allison University has been spending the summer in study at Chicago University and returned home some ten days since. He reports a very enjoyable as well as profitable term of three months.

Miss Crowell, of Yarmouth, through the superintendent of missions (Rev. George Steel), has generously donated a very fine organ to the Little River church on Courtenay Bay, St. John, and the friends there are delighted with it, and at the action of the gift.

W. S. Irvine, of St. John, who filled an appointment as student supply in the congregation of West River (P.E.I.), during the earlier months of the summer, left last Saturday for Chicago to complete his theological studies in McCormick Theological Seminary.

Rev. Dr. Polley, of Dalhousie (N. B.), has been appointed by the presbytery of Miramichi interim moderator of the session of Esquimaux (P. Q.), in the place of Rev. W. G. Firth of Tide Head resigned, on account of his health.

Rev. J. A. McKean has resigned his charge of Musquodoboit Harbor (N. S.), to enter upon post graduate studies in Princeton Theological Seminary. His resignation was accepted by the presbytery of Halifax at a special meeting held Sept. 3. Mr. McKean will leave Princeton at the end of the present month.

The coming synod to be held in St. John Oct. 5, will have at least three different nominating committees, each to choose from in its election of moderator. Rev. J. A. MacLean, of Mahone Bay (N. S.), for twenty-two years minister at Harvey Station (N. B.); Rev. H. R. Grant, secretary of the Nova Scotia Temperance Alliance; and Prof. J. W. Falconer, D. D., of Halifax Presbyterian College, have all been named.

Rev. J. J. McCaskill, of St. Matthew's church, St. John, who some months ago offered his services as chaplain in the Canadian Expeditionary Force, received word a few days ago of his appointment as chaplain to the 7th Highlanders at present in training in Montreal, and asking him to report duty as soon as possible. Mr. McCaskill is naturally much pleased with his appointment, and his many friends are offering congratulations. He has taken a deep interest in the war and its issues since the beginning, and is now active in the recruiting campaign, only this week having spent several days at Grand Manan on that mission. He will likely leave for Montreal by the end of the month or early in October.

Farnworth & Jardine's monthly wood circular, dated Liverpool, Sept. 1, contains the following of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia species and prices (including Manchester) for the past month, although slightly less than the previous month, were much in excess of corresponding period last year, viz., 15,580 stds. (about 88 per cent to Liverpool and 68 per cent to Manchester) against 14,600 stds. in August, 1914; the demand is fair, the deliveries large, viz., 10,940 stds. against 7,000 stds. last year, but stocks have further increased, are now heavy, and ample for probable requirements; values early in the month showed improvement and values are firmer. Ocean freights continue extreme, tonnage scarce. Pine deals are in fair request, stocks have recently been replenished.

On Monday night Messrs. Connon and McKenna will hold a meeting at Havelock, where a large number are expected to enroll.

St. Stephen Recruits.

St. Stephen, N. B., Sept. 18-The directors of the fair have decided to donate a tenth of the receipts of today to the Patriotic Fund.

The crowd at the exhibition was addressed this afternoon by Sergeant McKenna, of the 6th, who made a deep impression upon his hearers in his strong and earnest appeal for recruits. Recruiting Officer Major W. H. Laughlin, of St. Stephen, and Mr. Hipwell, of St. John, also delivered stirring addresses.

Major Laughlin has a recruiting tent on the fair grounds and already between twenty-five and thirty young men have signed on.

Recruiting in Amherst is being carried forward with a rush. Within two days Recruiting Officer Major W. A. Fillmore has sent 21 men to Sussex, 18 leaving Tuesday afternoon. Daily the total number reaches nearer to the 1,000 mark.

## WOODSTOCK HAD 47 RECRUITS IN THREE WEEKS

Woodstock, Sept. 19-Forty-seven stalwart young men have enlisted here during the past three weeks.

Last week Recruiting Officer Welsh sent six young men to Sussex and will send four more as soon as they are examined by doctor. The last to go forward were Joseph Farrell, 38, Ennis-Killen, Ireland; Charles Bromley, 26, Bath (N.B.); Percy Skymest, 21, Fairville (N.B.); Jno. J. McDonough, 28, Brookline (Mass.); Gladstone G. Merritt, 26, Bristol (N.B.); James Kelly, 26, Bristol (N.B.).

There is some talk of an effort to have the militia department utilize the army here this winter for the accommodation of some of the soldiers who will spend the winter in Canada, or as a recruiting and training point. The building can easily accommodate 400 men and is equipped with as good accommodation, under one roof, as any army in Canada.

It is heated by steam and the cost of putting in condition for permanent quarters would be very small.
