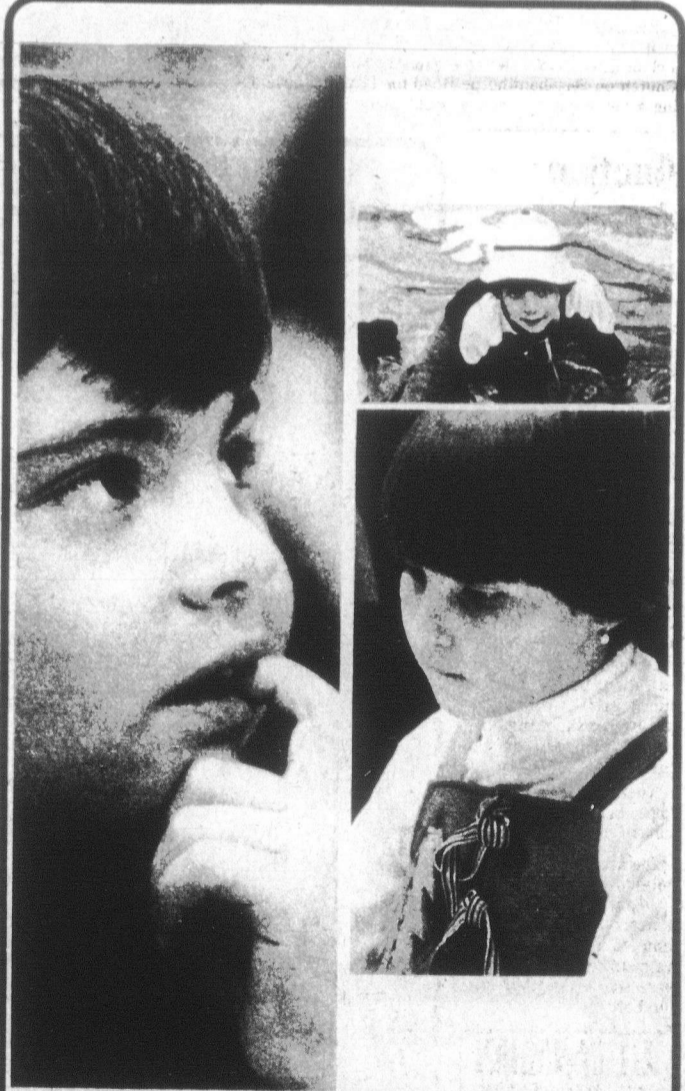

A special program for children

A unique children's program, combining nature with crafts, will be offered this summer at the Sheridan College School of Crafts and Design on South Sheridan Way, west of Mississauga Road.

Hands in the Earth, organized in cooperation with the Mississauga Parks and Recreation Department, will introduce children aged eight to 13 to pottery, weaving and paper making by taking them on trips to the source of the crafts.

Field trips will allow the children to explore nature and collect their own materials for the crafts they will learn to make later. They'll dig clay from natural deposits, search out

wildflowers to produce colorful dyes, participate in a sheep shearing, and collect grasses and other materials to be made into fabrics and paper.

The program will be taught by students at the school of crafts and design, using its well-equipped facilities and resources at 1460 South Sheridan Way.

There will be three, two-week sessions: July 4-14, July 18-28 and July 31-Aug. 11.

Cost for each session is \$35 per child. Registration is limited, so parents should reserve early.
