Like many preparations, the commercial marketing of this product was one of pioneering. It was foolishly begun with insufficient capital funds to bring about a sound education thru advertising with the inevitable results. This was as true in the United States as it was in Canada. True enuf money for new ventures was scarce when the campaigns began and conditions did not improve as time went on.
