and March (Lombard) streets, Toronto. When Upper Canada College was opened in 1831, Alderdice became janitor of the new building. After many years of faithful service he died at the College, October 9th, 1849. Water color. Size 4 x 5. Head and shoulders.

3681—ALDERDICE, DAVID—Janitor, U.C.C., 1849-67—The youngest son of Samuel Alderdice, for many years janitor of Upper Canada College, and the only member of the family born in Canada, his birth having taken place at York (Toronto) in 1831. On the death of his father, "Davy" succeeded to the janitorship. He died, Jan., 1867, in the comfortable brick lodge that stood on the west side of the Adelaide street gate of the College. Water color. Size 4 x 5. Head and shoulders.

3682—MARSHALL, JAMES—Janitor, U.C.C., 1867-70—Born in Quebec, 1840. Came to Toronto ten years later. Prior to being employed at Upper Canada College was for a time engaged in the rope-making business, then in the building trade. His death took place Jan. 11th, 1904. Water color. Size 4 x S. Head and shoulders.

3683—FROST, GEORGE—Janitor, Upper Canada College, Toronto, 1870-188—He was born in Bury St. Edmunds, Norfolk, Eng., 1845, and in 1860 joined the Fourth Brigade, R.A., of which he was instructor of carpentry, and spent the next ten years in garrison towns of England and Ireland. When his term expired he entered the service of the college, continuing until his death, 9th Nov., 1908. He was an expert mechanic, an all-round man, regarded as a human annex in the old school with which he was so long identified. Water color. Size 4 x 5. Head and shoulders.

3684—SIMMONS, GEORGE—Janitor, U.C.C., 1908-17—A native of Southampton, Eng.; born 1868. Prior to emigrating to Canada, in March, 1887, served on the Great Western Railway. Almost immediately on coming to Toronto found employment at Upper Canada College. Became assistant janitor of the institution, 1895, and in 1908 succeeded George Frost as janitor; still holds the position. Water color. Size 4 x 5. Head and shoulders.

3685—WHETHAM, CHARLES—First Modern Language Master, U.C.C., 1891—He was born Oct. 8th, 1857, in Beverley Township, Wentworth County; educated at University College, Toronto, and Paris; B.A., University of Toronto, 1884; M.A. the following year. He was principal and one of the founders of Whetham College, Vancouver, so called in honor of his brother, Dr. James Whetham, who financed it largely. Mr. Charles Whetham now (1917) resides at Westfield, N.Y., where he is engaged in grape growing. Water Color. Size 3 x 4. Head and shoulders.

3686—BLACKSTOCK, JOSEPH—Second Modern Language Master, U.C., 1885-91—He was born in Edinburgh, Scotland, 1852; educated at Maxwellton and Dumfries, and later at Toronto University; B.A., 1885. For a time he taught in Barrie Collegiate Institute. He was for several years in charge of Catholic Apostolic Churches in Kingston and Ottawa, and for eighteen years in Chicago. His death took place in the latter city, 5th Feb., 1917. Water color from portrait in possession of his daughter, Miss Edith A. Blackstock, Chicago. Size 3 x 4. Head and shoulders.

3687—BARBER, GEORGE ANTHONY—First English Master, U.C.C., Tornoto, 1839—Came from England to York in 1825, with Dr. Phillips, as principal assistant in the Home District Grammar School, acting as such until 1829. He later became English, writing, and arithmetic master in U.C.C. For a time was editor of Toronto "Herald." Mr. Barber was a high authority on the game of cricket, giving it enthusiastic encouragement in this country. He died in Toronto, 20th Oct., 1874. Water color. Size 3 x 4. Head and shoulders.
