CAHOE DISMISSED

New York Police Find a Startling Note.

The Naronic left Liverpool Feb. 11, 1898, with 4,000 tons of freight, a crew of 55 men, and fifteen passengers, who had gone to England on the previous trip in charge of a cargo of cattle. She has never seen after she left the Mersey.
