Pursuant to the Order of the Day, the following Petition was read;—

Of the Municipal Council of the United Counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry; praying for a grant of money for the purpose of constructing certain works necessary to connect the waters of the St. Lawrence with those of the Nation River.

Ordered, That the Honorable Mr. Attorney General Cartier have leave to bring in a Bill to amend the Act, Twenty-ninth Victoria, chapter seven, respecting works connected with the defence of the Province.

He accordingly presented the said Bill to the House, and the same was received and

read the first time; and ordered to be read a second time, to-morrow.

To the Right Honorable the Earl of Caernarvon, Secretary of State for the Colonies,—We, the Legislative Assembly of Canada, humbly thank Her Majesty for Her Gracious Message to the Governor General. We warmly feel that, by this great enterprise, we are drawn nearer to the Heart of our Mother Country.

Resolved, That a Message be sent to the Honorable the Legislative Council informing their Honors that this House hath resolved to send a Message to the Right Honorable the Earl of Caernarvon, and requesting that their Honors will unite with this House in the said Message.

Ordered, That the Honorable Mr. Attorney General Macdonald do carry the said

Message to the Legislative Council.

The Clerk of the Legislative Council delivered, at the Bar of the House, the following

Message:-

The Legislative Council return the Bill, intituled, "An Act to provide for ascertain"ing what persons have rights in the Commons of Berthier and Isle du Pads," and the Bill,
intituled, "An Act to incorporate the Ursuline Academy of Chatham," as desired by the
Legislative Assembly in their Message of this day.

And then he withdrew.
