GRANT FOR THE HYDRO RADIALS

(Special to The Ontario)

What will the Government do with the resolution of Thomas Marshall, Liberal member for Monck, asking the House to memorialize the Dominion Government to grant Hydro Radials the same subsidy as those given to steam railways?

A deputation from Ontario Municipalities will wait upon the Dominion Government this week with a similar request and the government, therefore, will likely take some action within a day or two.

If Mr. Marshall, supported by the Liberals in the House, forces the hands of the local government this time, he will merely be repeating what he did last session. On April 8th he moved a resolution emphasizing the need of cheap and convenient electric transportation and urging the Dominion Government to take up the project. The government did not accept the resolution at the time, but later, just before the close of the session, passed a Bill giving the Hydro Electric Commission power to proceed with the project in conjunction with municipalities.

Mr. Proffitt is another member of the Opposition who has given special attention to the power problem. More than a year ago he urged the construction of Radials by the Hydro Commission. All these measures have been supported by the Liberal members both in and out of the House.

WHAT ABOUT THE VOTE FOR WOMEN

(Special to The Ontario)

Toronto, March 24.—When the Women's Franchise Bills come up in the Legislature to-day (Tuesday) what will happen to them? This is the most interesting question for the moment in Provincial politics.

Will the Government accept the Elliott Bill, which grants the Municipal Franchise to married women, otherwise qualified, by owning property, by paying income tax, etc., and the Johnson Bill, which merely includes married women owning property, or will they reject both? It is the principle of the Elliott Bill that the voters of Toronto adopted with such an overwhelming majority at the recent Municipal elections and which has been endorsed throughout the Province.

All sorts of rumors are current. It is generally believed that the Opposition (Elliott) Bill will be thrown out. There seems to be considerable doubt as to the Johnson Bill, which is introduced by a private Conservative member.

This much is certain. The liquor interests are opposing both Bills, for if women's votes were added, could be carried in a considerable number of additional municipalities. The liquor men are more afraid of Elliott's Bill than of Johnson's, since the latter would probably enfranchise only about half as many as the former.
