MANY ANXIOUS TO SEE SOMME FILM

Numerous Inquiries Regarding Reservation of Seats at Colonial.

On July 1, 1916, the offensive was started, and that day the motion picture camera was mounted to take views of activities in the first line trenches. No movement of importance escaped its eyes. Scenes of men dying bravely, of men wounded and standing waiting for their turn for the stretcher, of the British forces, inspected the pictures. Haig's authority is absolute, and only a word or gesture from him would have eliminated any and all parts of the films. But in common with Mr Lloyd George and King George, he realized the importance of having the pictures presented to the people of the whole British Empire. His only modification was a change in one or two sub-titles in the films. He found no other changes necessary, as a result of the Somme battle are actual records of what occurred on July 1, when the offensive was begun.

Haig is the youngest commander-in-chief of any armies involved in the conflict. He is about 44 years old, a Scotchman, educated at Oxford and is recognized as one of the foremost military tacticians of the day. He distinguished himself particularly in the retreat from Mons to the Marne, and in the pursuit of the Germans back to the Aisne. He succeeded Viscount French as commander-in-chief when the latter retired about a year ago.

Sir Douglas Haig has the congenial personality of the Scotchman, and has many excellent characteristics. He is also an indefatigable worker, spending most of his time at his office at the front. He is peculiarly fitted to conduct warfare against the Germans, having served in a military capacity in Germany some years ago.

GOVT. TO CONTROL COAL INDUSTRY

Is Latest Project Advanced to Regulate Shipping Activity.

(Associated Press.) London, Oct. 24.—The Government is proposing to take over control of the coal industry of Great Britain in the near future, the main purpose of the scheme of nationalization being to give a certain power of control over the neutral shipping which coals at British ports. Coal owners will be allowed to take their own profits if the scheme goes through, but the Government will control the distribution of coal for home consumption, for export and for shipping. For some time past the government has used its authority over British shipping to direct its courses most beneficial for the nation, but neutral steam shipping, though dependent on Britain for coal, has not recognized a resulting obligation to this country. The plan is that if the government owns the coal it will be in a position to stipulate the use the customer shall make of it and to require him to call for his return cargo at specified ports. In that way it is believed the whole of the shipping in British ports may be organized and directed.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN SOBER WEST LAND REGULATIONS

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a plot must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Application for a homestead may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence each of three years after settling homesteaded plot; out; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Free-emption may be obtained as well as homesteaded plot, on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon cultivation of the land to each of three years. A homesteader may live within six miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$2.00 per acre.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 40 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. W. W.
