## 19 NORWEGIAN SHIPS ARE SUNK

During Month of November, Total Tonnage of 32,000

London, Dec. 8.—A Reuter despatch from Christchurch says it is announced by the Norwegian minister of commerce that in November nineteen Norwegian vessels, with a total tonnage of 32,993, were lost.

The sinking of the Greek Steamship Pireos, 1,061 tons gross, by a German submarine, is reported in a Reuter despatch from Las Palmas, Canary Islands.

Reuter's correspondent at Stavanger, Norway, says the Norwegian Steamship Sleith, has been sunk by a German submarine.
