MILITARY PARTY GAINS VICTORY

In Respect to Territorial Policy of Germany Die is Cast
EMPEROR SUPREME
Report a United Austro-German Front as Against Russia

—London, Jan. 20.—The German latest reports which have come through Amsterdam, to which city they were forwarded by the semi-official Wolff Bureau, Italy assert that the military party has gained the victory in the territorial policy of Germany, and show what face that country proposes to put on annexations in the East. The gains in the East, as they are presented are that the peoples in these countries already have determined their future status through existing representative bodies and that this determination is irrevocable.

Whether the German newspapers from which these reports have been taken represent the general feeling or an extract called by the conspiracy for circulation abroad remains to be seen. The Tagliche Rundschau, of Berlin, says: "We learn that a complete agreement has been reached in a conference between the higher army command and the Chancellor regarding the settlement of all Eastern questions. These are to be regarded as a united whole, and therefore the Lithuanian, Courland and Polish questions are to be considered as all connected with one another. This position gives a united Austro-German front against Russia. The situation is based on the present representative bodies in Lithuania, Courland and Poland, whose unanimous declarations are in our hands. These declarations are not extended, but not cancelled. There is likewise a full understanding that effective safeguards must be created in the west."

"The issue of the Government crisis appears to be a victory for the followers of von Kuehlmann in form, but for the pan-Germans in fact." The London Morning Post Zeitung views the result. It continues: "Frontier rectifications are to be striven for, and while preserving in appearance the principle of self-determination of peoples, the Government has not entirely, but in its essential point, submitted to the pan-German demand."

The London Morning Post says the political leaders have given abundant assurances that after Russia's unsuccessful ultimatum to England and France, they feel no obligation to ally themselves with "no annexation and so indomitable" to the west, but will rather go in the direction of giving the military an entirely free hand and maintaining actively free hand for their own decisions.

"It is not forgotten in England," the paper continues, "that the Emperor is the present circumstances the dictator of Germany's destinies, and, as far as Germany's policy affects that of the destinies of the rest of the world. The military leaders and commandants have been conferring with him jointly and individually during the past fortnight, urging their views. The Crown Prince is the only other person admitted to the supreme councils. The great commercial and other interests are not represented in the councils, save as the Chancellor or Foreign Minister may speak for them. The Emperor is the Supreme court, and with him is the final decision of policy."

Commenting on this statement one of the London newspapers says: "What that shifting mind may do none can predict."

GENERAL STRIKE IS ON IN AUSTRIA

100,000 Men Reported to Have Quit Work in Vienna and Neustadt
FACTORIES CLOSED
Strikers Are Described as Being Openly Anti-German
A DEMAND FOR PEACE
Socialist Back Movement, Which is Both Political and Economical

London, Jan. 21.—A general strike is on throughout Austria, according to an Exchange Telegraph despatch from Paris to-day, which reports 100,000 men quitting work in Vienna and Neustadt, closing down all the war factories. The strikers are described as openly anti-German and the movement as both political and economic, and especially aimed at securing peace. Public demonstrations, it is added, have been held in many places at which hostility towards Berlin for trying to force the Austrians to continue the war was voiced.

A despatch from Stockholm says: Reports of strikes and other demonstrations in Austria, which the Austrian Government has permitted to be telegraphed abroad, acquire new significance when read in connection with the Vienna Arbeiter Zeitung's report of five Socialist meetings held in Vienna last Sunday. The meetings, which were attended by vast numbers of persons protested against robbing the Austrian people of all influence in the peace negotiations by continually postponing the meetings of the Chamber of Deputies and the delegates and by suppressing all criticism in the press of Germany's and Austria's foreign policy."

The Peace Negotiations
The meetings demanded that the peace negotiations at Brest-Litovsk be conducted in a friendly spirit, "that the government reject all efforts toward open or veiled annexations, and that it reject the demand that Russia's border nations' right of self-determination be rendered illusory, and also reject the desire to annex portions of these lands against the will of the inhabitants."

The Socialists also demanded that the people of Poland, Lithuania and Courland be permitted to vote freely on the question of the form of their state and their allegiance.

A resolution adopted by the meetings further declared that the Socialists regard the peace programme of Premier Lloyd George and President Wilson as a sign that even the enemy nations can be forced by the

The sole head of a family, or any man over 18 years old, who was at the commencement of the present war, and has since continued to be a British subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for District. Entry papers may be made on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon cultivation of land in each of three years.

On certain districts a homesteader may secure an adjoining quarter-section as well as the main section. Pre-emption. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence upon cultivation of land in each of three years after earning homestead patent and \$1.00 per acre. May obtain pre-emption patent as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions.

A settler after obtaining homestead patent, if he cannot secure a pre-emption, may take a homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years.

Holders of entries may count time of employment as farm labourers in Canada during 1917 as residence duties under certain conditions.

When Dominion Lands are advertised or posted for entry, returned soldiers who have served overseas and have been honorably discharged, receive one day priority in applying for entry at local Agency's Office (but not Sub-Agency). Discharge papers must be presented to Agent.

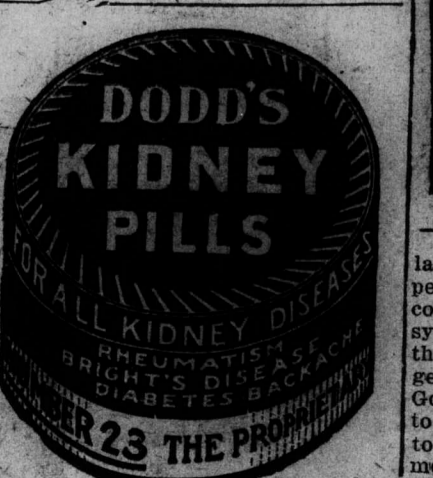
