Issued by the Canada Food Board in collaboration with experts on the staff of the Dominion Exal Farm

TO WAR GARDENERS

The Canada Food Board has arranged with officials of the Experimental Farm at Ottawa for a daily bulletin which will be of practical assistance to residents . who have undertaken to produce their own vegetables in back yard and vacant iot gardens. Those little notes will be short, seasonable and to the point. They will contain daily suggestions as to the next most pressing duty from day to day. In some districts the season is earlier than in others. Readers will. therefore be able to tell at a glance whether they are up to date with the general programme or whether they are ahead, and govern themselves accordingly. The subjects touched

will include tools, seed beds. fertilizers, seeds, weeds, pests, cultivation and such other information as will be suggested in the course of the season by experts in practical gardening. By following these hints it is hoped that the most inexperienced gardener will be sure of a good crop of vegetables this summer. By the generally increased consumption of vegetables conservation will be effected of staples like wheat and meat, the shortage of which threatens to be a calamity in Europe and a danger to our success in the war. And the health of our own people will be improved. Watch for the daily bulletin to war time gardens.


