

CO OPERATIVE EXPERIMENTS IN AGRICULTURE

Material for any one of the six experiments here mentioned will be sent free to any Ontario farmer applying for it, if he will conduct an experiment with great care and report the results after harvest next year. The seed will be sent out in the order in which applications are received as long as the supply lasts.

1—Testing three leading varieties of Winter Wheat, 3 plots.

2-Testing one leading variety of Winter Rye and one of Winter Wheat, Dowsley.

3—Testing Spring applications of five fertilizers with Winter Wheat, 6

4-Testing Autumn and Spring applications of Nitrate of Soda and Common Salt with Winter Wheat, 5

plots. 5—Testing Winter Emmer Winter Barley, 2 plots.

6—Testing Hairy Vetches and Winter Lye as Fodder Crops, 2 plots.
The exact size of each plot is to be one rod wide by two rods long. The material for experiments Nos. 1, 2, 3 5 and 6 will be forwarded by mail, and for the other one by express. Each person wishing to conduct one of these experiments should apply as soon as possible, mentioning which test he desires, and the material, with instructions for testing and the blank form on which to report, will be furnished free of cost until the supply of
