Dr. Battisby occupied the pulpit and took for the subject of his discourse their first appearance to the Sons on their first appearance in his church, the 12th verse of the 33rd Psalm, "Blessed is the nation whose God is the Lord; and the people whom He hath chosen for His inheritance." Dr. Battisby said he was glad to have the Sons of English land present. National integrity or right doing applied to the British gov-ernment most pre-eminently. Her enemies might falsely say that she was greedy and grasping, but was not
